Governor White Names Day of Thanksgiving for the State of North Dakota.

Governor White has issued his Thanksgiving proclamation in the following terms:

In accordance with the sacred custom of our fathers and in conformity with the proclamation of the president of the United States I do hereby name Thursday the twenty-sixth day of November as a day of Thanksgiving for the state of North Dakota.

In gratitude to the Father who has given us the full measure of peace and plenty I do recommend that on this day we cease from our usual labors and render praise and thanksgiving for the many blessings we have received during the closing year.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the state of North Dakota at the Capitol at Bismarck, this twelfth day of November, 1903.
