IRRIGATION PLANS.

Citizens of Mandan Meet With Engineer Robbins of the Federal Irrigation Bureau. Mandan Pioneer: On Wednesday night at The Mandan Pioneer office, a number of citizens of Mandan met Engineer S. B. Robbins, of the United States reclamation service.

Mr. Robbins made a preliminary statement to the meeting, in which he remarked that there were difficulties in the way of the government doing irrigation work in this state, which many of the citizens were not aware of. In the first place there are no high mountains containing melting snows to supply irrigation works when the water is needed, as is the case in many of the states where government money is being expended.

ence in seeing alfalfa grow in Montana. Mr. Robbins said that in each locality it was largely a matter of experiment with the farmer to know just how much water to put on his land. What this section of North Dakota needs is an experiment station where irrigation measures can be tried, and where it can be demonstrated to visitors just how the work should be done to procure the best results.

Mr. Robbins urged the necessity of a good water rights law for this state. He said that the law in Montana was a poor one, and that Wyoming had the best of any state in the union.
