TO IMPEACH SWAYNE
HOUSE ADOPTS THE TWELVE ARTICLES AGAINST THE JUDGE FROM FLORIDA.
COMMITTEE WILL BE APPOINTED TO CONDUCT PROCEEDINGS BEFORE THAT BODY.

Washington, Jan. 19.—The house of representatives Wednesday adopted the twelve articles of impeachment against Judge Charles Swayne of the district court of the Northern district of Florida, which had been presented by its special committee of investigation. The speaker was authorized to appoint seven members to present the case to the senate and conduct the impeachment proceedings before that body. This action was the culmination of a debate which has been in progress for over a week and which has developed partisan feeling and personal vituperation. The first vote, that to table the first three articles, those relating to the falsification of expenses, went against Judge Swayne by the narrow margin of five votes. This was regarded as the test vote, as the charge regarding expenses was the only one concurred in by the members of the committee signing the minority report. The motion to table these articles was lost, 160 to 165. Twenty-four Republicans voted with the Democrats against tabling and three Democrats voted with the Republicans to table. On roll call these three articles were adopted.

Subject of a Separate Vote.
Articles four and five, relating to the free use of a private car by Judge Swayne, were made the subject of a separate vote and adopted. Like action followed with regard to Articles six and seven, charging him with non-residence in his district. This was the last roll call, as when Articles eight, nine, ten and eleven, relating to the Davis-Belden contempt case and Article twelve, relating to the O'Neal contempt case, were declared adopted on viva voce votes. The last time the house voted to present articles of impeachment was in 1875, when it voted the impeachment of W. W. Belmont, secretary of war under President Grant. The debate Wednesday was chiefly notable for the closing arguments in the case. That for Judge Swayne was made by Mr. Gillett of California and that for impeachment by Mr. Palmer of Pennsylvania. Mr. Gillett made an earnest plea for the judge, and Mr. Palmer spoke strongly for purity on the bench and for impeachment.

FAILS TO GET OFFICE
EIGHT MISSOURI REPUBLICANS REFUSE TO VOTE FOR T. K. NIEDRINGHAUS.

Jefferson City, Mo., Jan. 19.—The bolt of six Republicans on the first and two more on the second ballot from the ranks of Thomas K. Niedringhaus, the Republican caucus nominee for United States senator to succeed Francis M. Cockrell, whose election had been assured, resulted in no choice Wednesday in the joint session of the legislature. With the exception of one who cast his ballot for Dr. Pettijohn of Linn county, all the bolters voted for Richard C. Kerens of St. Louis, who was the strongest opponent of Niedringhaus in the caucus. Immediately after the second ballot, which resulted as follows, the joint session adjourned until Thursday, when balloting will be resumed at noon: Niedringhaus, 85; Cockrell, 83; Kerens, 7; Pettijohn, 1.

On the first ballot Niedringhaus received 87 votes, two less than necessary of the number required for election; Cockrell received 83 and Kerens received 6. The defeat of Mr. Niedringhaus was predicted Wednesday following a conference of the Kerens men with their leader, just before the meeting of the joint session. Oldest Member Bolted. The break came when John L. Bittinger of Buchanan, who is the oldest member of the house, cast his ballot for R. C. Kerens and his example was followed by Glover Branch, F. R. Cook, C. E. Elliott, James Roach and Oliver Grace. On the second ballot George Hatzfeldt switched over to Kerens, while E. M. Kirkham voted for Dr. Pettijohn.

After the joint session adjourned the Republican members of the legislature held a conference. Representative Bittinger was the only one of the members who bolted Niedringhaus that attended. The conference selected a committee to see that all members were present Thursday at the joint session and to arrange for pairs with Democrats if any members were absolutely unable to be on hand. Democratic members of the house held a caucus and discussed plans for reorganizing the house and deposing Speaker Hill. No definite conclusions were reached. Kerens has opened headquarters and saty announces that he will defeat Niedringhaus.

WILL MAKE ANSWER TO RUSSIA.
China to Reply to Charges That She Violated Neutrality.

Washington, Jan. 19.—It is the expectation here that China will make answer to the Russian complaint that she has violated neutrality directly to Paul Lessar, the Russian minister to Peking. None of the powers has been asked to co-operate with the United States in representations to Russia deprecating a violation of Chinese neutrality by way of retaliation of the matters complained of in the Russian note, but it would not surprise the government here if some of the powers did act on similar lines in the in the interest of the world's peace. The London report that the Russians have seized Kashgar in Turkestan is believed here to be an erroneous interpretation of a Russian movement to strengthen the considerable guard which Russia has of late years maintained at its consulate in Kashgar.

Russian Squadron at Jibuti.
Aden, Arabia, Jan. 19.—The third division of the Russian Second Pacific squadron, commanded by Rear Admiral Botrovsky, which left Suez Jan. 12, has arrived at Jibuti, French Somaliland.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.
E. H. Coulbord, who was King Edward's instructor in art, is dead at London.

The Danish folketing adopted a motion of confidence in the new ministry Wednesday by 63 to 38 votes. Cuba's production of tobacco for the year 1904 was 410,160 bales, an increase of 74,000 bales over the yield of 1903.

A cabinet crisis is believed to be imminent in Serbia and it is expected a new cabinet will be formed by the regicide party. John Piening of New York defeated H. H. Egeberg of Denmark in their Graeco-Roman wrestling match at New York Wednesday. The Dane quit after each had gained a fall, claiming injury to his arm, and the referee awarded the match to Piening.
