OBITUARY

Mr. Michael Grady, of this city passed peacefully away at his home here, Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. The cause of his death being cancer of the stomach. In September last he went to Rochester, Minn., where he underwent an operation at the Mayo hospital, from which he never fully recovered.

Michael Grady was born in Limerick, Ireland, in 1849 and came to this country with his mother and sister when a young man of 20. He first located in the state of New York and later in Wyocena, Wis. Waterways People Conclude Their Interesting Meeting ---Want \$50,000,000

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7.—An annual appropriation of at least \$50,000,000 for the improvement of international waterways of America is the gist of the recommendations of the Rivers and Harbors Congress, which concluded its session today. No particular project was advocated by the convention, the recommendations of the committee on resolutions, which were adopted unanimously, being that a national policy for the improvement of international waterways be adopted by the congress of the United States.

At the opening of today's session of the convention telegrams were read from Senator Perkins, industrial organizations and commercial bodies of California, inviting the congress to hold its next annual meeting in San Francisco.

In introducing John A. Fox of Arkansas, special director of the congress, President Ransdell said that Mr. Fox had spent the last year in traveling over the country and doing splendid work for the congress. In the course of his report, Mr. Fox said that during the year he had visited twenty-two states and ninety-nine cities, had given out forty-four public interviews, written five magazine articles and had delivered 168 addresses, none of which had been before the national organization. He was satisfied that if the United States congress was in possession of the information which he had presented, the work of congress practically would have been accomplished. He urged an appropriation by the association of \$40,000 for the continuance of its work during the next year.

Col. F. S. Ellison, secretary of the congress, whom President Ransdell characterized as "one of the finest workers and organizers in the country," presented his annual report, in which he gave the expenditures on behalf of the work of the congress during the year. The balance on hand, he said, was \$2,272.

STRANGE CASE

WOMAN DIES FROM RESULT OF FRIGHT FROM A DREAM

Ashley Tribune, Nov. 28.—The death of Mrs. Gottlieb Binderwald, the wife of a farmer living several miles east and north of Ashley, died at six o'clock this morning. The report that reached town was that Gottlieb Binderwald and Martin Schlabsz had a fight in the course of which Binderwald's arm was bitten, and that seeing the arm in a swollen and discolored condition so frightened Mrs. Binderwald as to cause premature childbirth, resulting in the woman's death. However, Jakob Binderwald tells us that his brother's trouble with Schlabsz occurred on the thirteenth of this month; that Mrs. Binderwald gave birth to a child a week afterward, and was in good health afterward and was in good health until a week ago, when, one night, she awoke very much excited and alarmed after a dream in which she thought she was helping her husband in a desperate encounter with some one, which excitement brought on the sickness resulting in the woman's death.
