GUSHING OIL WELL IS ON FIRE
Flames Mount Hundreds of Feet Into The Air Near Taft, Cal.
TAFT, Cal., June 8.—Fire that started in the engine room of Well No. 3 of the Buick Oil Company, near Fellows, jumped to a 5,000-barrel lake of oil and then ignited the 7,000 gusher of the Pacific crude oil company, 100 feet away. The flames mounted hundreds of feet into the air and were seen from Taft, seven miles away. It is believed the well will burn for days. The loss will be about \$2,500 daily.

HAS A NEW DRINK.
Ormsby McHarg Discloses the Formula for His Cooling "Grasshopper Punch."
CHICAGO, June 8.—Ormsby McHarg, Colonel Roosevelt's official contest attorney, ordered a drink in the cafe of a Michigan avenue hotel and not a bartender in the fashionable place could mix it.

Fargo Fire Anniversary.
FARGO, June 8.—Fargo today observed the anniversary of the great fire of 1893, which almost completely wiped away the city, but which has since been regarded as a blessing in disguise as the city was rebuilt on a more substantial basis and has enjoyed an era of great prosperity. The fire was one of the most disastrous ever suffered by any city in the Northwest. It swept over an area of forty-two city blocks and destroyed property valued at more than \$3,000,000.

PROGRESS BEING MADE BY THE DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE

During the year we have spent or caused to be expended for advertising the American Northwest \$102,000 at the cost of \$3 500 to the seven states.
The object of our work is to carry a personal message about the American Northwest from the men and women who know about it, to the thousands of men and women who are supposed to wish to know.
We must create a conception of a new division of the North American Continent, in the minds of human beings—the American Northwest must be known and understood to be the great zone of plenty, which stretches from the Mississippi Valley to the Pacific Ocean, along the Canadian border.
The master mind of James J. Hill has given us the best definition of the Northwest Development League—"It is a grouping of business entities having work in common which the can accomplish better united than divided."
There are nine hundred commercial clubs between the Great Lakes and Puget Sound, and but three hundred of them will answer a letter of inquiry, when people write them offering to do something for their communities.
We have to invest our money and brains to advertise the American Northwest, to insure normal growth—to make certain that we will get two million added to our population during the coming decade as we did in the past ten years.
With the competition of Canada, the New South, the Southwest and the Middle Atlantic States, we cannot expect a normal number of settlers to come to the states represented in this league, unless we work to secure them. Conditions actually exist which will prevent actual growth, and we have to overcome them.
Of the \$100,000 expended during the year, the cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis furnished \$25,000 of the amount.
There is nothing selfish about the Northwest Development League; it has to do with increasing the aggregate number of people and amount of wealth coming into the American Northwest, and state must do individual work to secure its percentage of the general results.

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 8.—In a "report" which minimized past activities of the Northwest Development League and sought to point out how a systematic campaign may be carried out by an organization of the seven Northwest States, to bring them big returns by the more rapid development of their natural resources and settlement of their lands, Will A. Campbell secretary of the organization, today outlined the plans for future work of the most definite and result getting nature.
Mr. Campbell became secretary a year ago, and with a capital of \$1,000 paid in by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads, has paid out or had expended directly through this office, the sum of \$102,000 in advertising the American Northwest. Of this amount the states have paid but \$3,500 for membership in the league, and all other money paid by communities into enterprises of the league, has been paid for things of definite value to the community and for their individual benefit.
"The most important thing before the Northwest Development Congress is to determine what the league should do," said Mr. Campbell. "It is easy enough to do things out here in this great country, if we can first determine the necessity of doing them, and definitely settle the way in which they should be accomplished. Financing such a campaign is easy as compared to outlining a reasonable plan, which will be considered a good cold-blooded business proposition by the best and rightest business men of the Northwest."
We have had a great many things to do. They have been done as every one who is in touch with the work knows, but the most important thing we have accomplished, is to get many minds to thinking over what should be done, and determining to do something.
Here are a few things which your secretary's office has determined as necessary:
Eliminate the waste in community advertising; quit depending on free publicity; get the message in papers and magazines outside the states in a legitimate way. The publicity which is ordinarily considered free news matter will follow.
We must inaugurate a campaign of mouth to mouth advertising, and take samples of our products down into the east and middle west, and show the people there what can be produced. Showing the products of the land humanizes advertising so that it breathes, speaks, whispers, thunders, button-holes, hooks, arms, tugs at heart strings, hammers on the brain, gets in and under. There is nothing as good as showing the goods themselves—they tell their own story, create confidence. No language, no pictures will equal a display of the products themselves. If you have not the goods to show, you have no right to advertise.
It is absolute waste to invest in costly booklets, showing beautiful pictures, and expect these to interest people in a community or a section. We must interest the people first, and then they will be ready for the booklets. The average booklet is nonsense. If you don't believe it take one of the booklets which tells about your community, and commit a couple of pages of it to memory, then when you are talking about your town to some friend, repeat the stuff to him, try it as a part of your conversation, and you will be disgusted at its weakness and shocked at its inaccuracy.
The Northwest Development League stands for absolute honesty in all advertising, and would like to see a law on the statute books of every state, making it a felony to make untrue statements about lands, cities and communities in published advertising matter.
There has been so much damnable advertising done in one way or another, by all sections of this country, and others, that people are losing confidence in published statements, and especially in community booklets and real estate advertising matter.
To overcome this, suppose we put

get another presented and passed at the next session of congress.

The Northwest Development League must demand a more liberal policy on the part of our United States land office. It is generally accepted that Mr. Dooley told the truth when he said: "The United States bet a home-seeker 160 acres of land that he cannot live on it five years." Then the government through its special agents and red tape officials, jumps in and tries to win the bet.
To have any influence at Washington, the Northwest Development League must have the united support of the commercial organizations of the Northwest. There are a number of measures which must be killed and some important ones to be secured. When we send out the appeal for help, we must depend on having it. If we get to Washington and need assistance of your congressmen and senators, it is you who can make them step lively.
More efficiency is needed in our commercial clubs throughout the American Northwest. They are wasting a tremendous amount of money and energy by the narrowness of their patriotism. Doing some good work as far as their own communities are concerned, they are unconscious of a larger unity of life. Their money is wasted because their states are not known; because the Northwest is not known. They fail to succeed, because of the narrow selfishness of their communities. Growth cannot be obtained by any city by blindly struggling for itself, against all others

and ignoring the country about it, which must support and make it grow.

GAIN TURNS TO LOSS
City Will Probably Have to Pay \$750 a Month for Removal of Dead Animals.
CHICAGO, June 8.—Chicago probably will have to pay \$750 a month for the next sixteen months to have dead animals removed from the streets and alleys.
Heretofore the city received \$25 a year from the Canal Melting Company for the privilege of doing the work. The company's contract has expired and it informed the city yesterday that it wants \$750 a month to do the work for the next sixteen months, when the garbage disposal contract expires.
Because the city has no facilities for caring for dead animals and no other concern appears to want the contract for a short period, it is likely that the city council will have to agree to the company's terms for a renewal.
"The price is very high," said Mayor Harrison, "but it looks as if the city will have to pay it."
Dr. George B. Young, commissioner of health, and Alderman Richard, chairman of the council finance committee, held a conference with the mayor and tried to devise some plan which would avoid paying the high price.
