

She smiled and then took part in animated whisperings as Senator Eliot James brought out yell after yell when he had got his stride in his speech as permanent chairman. She laughed heartily at that sentence. Mrs. Taft led the handclapping among her party at the close of the permanent chairman's speech.

NORTH DAKOTA CLUBS.

The contest for the presidency of the National federation at the biennial is becoming spirited. More than 20 state delegations held caucuses and selected their members of the nominating committee. The names of these were announced by President Moore Saturday. The friends of Mrs. Philip Carpenter and Mrs. Percy V. Pennypacker, the former of New York and the latter of Texas, the two leading and possibly the only candidates for the office of president, are trying to get a line on the members of the nominating committee to ascertain just what their voting strength will be.

At Mrs. Carpenter's headquarters Saturday it was said that New York would move her nomination no matter what the choice of the nominating committee. The same action has been decided upon by the Texas delegation which advocated Mrs. Pennypacker's election to the office.
