



NEWSY GOSSIP FROM NATIONAL CAPITOL

Clergymen and the heads of families in spots far remote from Washington will assuredly take to heart the lesson learned at the National Capital that the moving picture shows are knocking spots out of the liquor saloons, and are wholesome factors in inducing men to drop the saloon lounging habit and to take their families to "the movies." Reliable statistics gathered by the excise board officials, during the year just closed, exhibit a very heavy decrease in the sale of intoxicants, and investigation following that startling fact has proved that in every section of Washington the cheap picture theatres are the compelling cause.

Both wholesale and retail liquor dealers tell these folks that these "movies" are the only form of recreation sought in large measure by the men, whether government employes or clerks, etc., who formerly made some favorite saucer their club resort where they met their friends and acquaintances for a social evening. Now, instead of going to that saloon, it seems, this large body of patrons after supper take their wives and families and do around of the shows. The saloon men say that this form of pleasure is increasing by leaps and bounds to the decided disadvantage of the liquor trade. What would be the cost of a round or two of drinks in a saloon for a party of four; friends is more than sufficient to pay the admission price for an entire family in to two or more moving picture shows. Even for an economic standpoint this new departure is a big money saver.

One of the Congressional investigations that is to begin holding its session a couple of weeks after the election is Pule's money trust probe, and in his effort to obtain evidence of unlawful control of the nation's currency by a combination of bankers of all sizes and conditions, the Louisiana is to be assisted by Samuel Untermyer, of New York, under whose direction experts are busy preparing an elaborate compilation of statistics, embracing practically every financial and industrial institution in the country, and tracing the relation of each individual concern to other concerns.

In the attempt to show that a small group of rich men has a firm and controlling grip on the country's finances, subpoenas have been issued, it is claimed, for such men as J. Pierpont Morgan, George W. Perkins, John D. Rockefeller, William Rockefeller, George F. Baker, Ed. Stotesbury and Cleveland H. Dodge. The inquiry will be directed at first to ascertain the exact influence, if any, exerted by Gotham's banks and bankers and financiers on other banks, bankers and financiers in other parts of the United States.

If the report of the "efficiency and economy commission" is to be heeded, the Old Ford's Theatre building, where President Lincoln was shot by Wilkes Booth, is to be torn down and replaced with a modern business structure. It is one of the historic landmarks of Washington, and the mecca of thousands upon thousands of visitors yearly from all parts of the civilized world.

The building has been used by the government for many years as a storage warehouse for the records of the adjutant-general's office, and, since its collapse about 20 years ago, when a score of government clerks lost their lives and many more were injured, it has been regarded as unsafe even after wholesale repairs for minor office purposes. It is quite possible that a permanent Lincoln museum will be erected on its site, a handsome structure open at all times to the public and large enough to contain for exhibition all of the relics of the emancipator in the government's possession, as well as those privately owned. It will be remembered that, time and time again, Congressmen from almost every State in the Union have introduced bills providing for such a national collection, but they have all been pigeon-holed, and not one of them obtained the serious consideration of either branch of the congress.

In this old play-house centers one of the most painful and tragic incidents in the history of our nation. Here, in what was then acknowledged to be the premier theatre of the National Capital, as all the world knows, on the night of April 14, 1865, Wilkes Booth, an actor of ability and considerable histrionic reputation, entered the President's box and shot Abraham Lincoln, leaving from the box to the stage, Booth fell and broke his leg, the spur of his heel having caught in the flag draping the box, throwing him to the floor. In spite of this, Booth sprang to his feet, flourishing the still smoking pistol and shouting "Sic semper tyrannis," hobbled into the wings, thence to the adjacent alley, where he mounted a horse and rode off into the darkness.

There are few school boys or school girls in North Dakota who have not read the pathetic story of this awful tragedy, and they can instantly tell you that it was during a performance of "Our American Cousin," with Laura Keane in the cast, that the assassination occurred. Like all the mature readers of the The Bismarck Tribune, they can recall the sad story of how Booth, headed off in every attempt to escape across the Potomac was at last cornered in an abandoned barn, where, after a fight lasting for several hours, he was shot to death by Austin Corbett, whilst the ramshackle barn was burning above his head.

But none of them know that the man, who it is claimed, held Booth's horse in the dark alleyway at that fatal night, still lives here in Washington, and may be seen almost any day—a miserable, pathetic figure, stunted, lean and weakened, clad in rags, eking out a pitiful existence, selling matches, shoe strings, and the little

odds and ends that make up the stock of the broken down street peddler.

Just two days after the inauguration of the next President of the United States the second annual Federal Aid Good Roads convention, under the auspices of the American Automobile Association, will hold its sessions in Washington on March 6, and 7, 1913. It is stated that the success of the former convention was so pronounced last January that the god roads board of the association has decided to make a federal aid gathering an annual feature, until federal aid has become a substantial fact through Congressional action.

The main idea is to secure Congressional authority for the construction and maintenance of a comprehensive system of national highways. Two-thirds of the States of the Union were represented by properly accredited delegates at the last convention, when it was determined to memorialize Congress for the appointment of a Joint Senatorial and House Committee to investigate the whole subject of federal aid and formulate a feasible programme for the carrying out of the work of construction, etc. Of course, its action will be one of the leading matters before the new Congressional body, after it begins its usual grind after March 4th. No matter what the present Congress may do, its action will not by any means be the last word on the subject, for the association has so timed this convention as to make it coincident with the opening of the "labors" of the new Congress.

Born and raised in Lewis County, in Ole Kaintuck, on the south bank of the Ohio River, Senator Thomas H. Paynter, who is in Washington as a member of the Clapp Expense Investigating Committee, talks enthusiastically on the improvement of the country's inland waterways and its immense importance to the wholesome progress of our national commerce. "There never was a time," he says, "when we could better appreciate than now the wisdom of the provision of the makers of the Constitution when they gave us the right to care for the navigation of the inland waterways."

an economic and efficient nationwide system of inland navigation. We shall see our civilization and prosperity advance in proportion to the degree of improvement we accomplish upon all our highways by land and water. All of this great Republic is vitally concerned in keeping to the highest possible achievement the navigation of the Mississippi River, which, with its splendid tributaries, constitutes the most important primary highway of commerce in the world. That being done, all mankind may enjoy the fruits of the most fertile region on the earth.

"It goes without saying that a vital part of the public duty in this performance of public work is the maintenance of an adequate levee system. I have no doubt that if the government expended only a fraction of the amount of the loss suffered by property by breaks and overflows on the Mississippi River, it would be sufficient to keep the levees intact and efficient for all time to come. Another thing that cannot too often and too earnestly be impressed is that unless that we go on with this improvement of the Mississippi River and caring for the levee system, neglecting no part of it, whether individuals are benefited or not, we would better never have undertaken the building of the Panama Canal, for, with the Mississippi River's vast navigational possibilities neglected or indifferently treated, the great canal project would have involved a waste of money as far as we are concerned, and other commercial nations would reap the benefits. But the whole world of peaceful commerce is deeply concerned in the navigation of the waters of the Mississippi Valley, the world's grandest area of food production.

LEARNED THE LESSON.

Then the Igorrotes Spread the Glad Greeting Broadcast.

Some experiences of the first days of schoolteaching in the Philippines are described by Alice M. Kelly in the Manila Times. She went among the Igorrotes in November, 1901, so that she can really be considered a veteran.

The natives were frightened at the sight of an American woman, and not even prized dainties like sardines could bribe them to her. They spoke no English or Spanish, and she had not a word of Igorrote.

But she resolved to break this silence, and, catching one old man who could not run, she repeated over and over again, "Good morning, Mrs. Kelly," till at last, to escape, he repeated the words after her. Not long after she heard that Americans were being greeted, regardless of sex, with a cheery "Good morning, Mrs. Kelly."

And, oddest of all, in a courtroom several Igorrotes solemnly walked up to the judges' bench and, bowing deeply, said, "Good morning, Mrs. Kelly," evidently well satisfied that they had done the correct thing.

The school which Mrs. Kelly founded has become the Igo school.


