WASHINGTON, APRIL 1.—Woman suffrage campaigns in almost every state of the Union are henceforth to be conducted from the new headquarters in Washington, No. 1420 F street, Northwest. Here the women are busy all day long, receiving information of the progress of the movement from every section of the United States, sending out instructions and credentials, forming new committees and organizations, all intent on comprehensive preparations for the monster mass meeting to be held in the Columbia theater on April 7, and the important events expected to follow the "historic advance on the capitol."

ings have thus shown, say high naval experts, that they have actually perfected within a short space of time what prominent Canadians have asserted that the Dominion cannot do, except at the risk of embarking upon a separatist policy which would eventually eliminate Canada from the British Empire. According to the Australian cablegrams the purely Australian fleet unit, under the direction of an admiral subject to the control of the government of the Australian Commonwealth will come into being on the first of July next. Some of the vessels to be included in the fleet are in Australia, but they are being assembled in Australian waters and will form the real basis of a straight-out Australian fleet unit, ready at all times to protect and defend that Commonwealth, as well as to co-operate with any of the fleets of the Motherland.

The advice says, in part: "The present year will see momentous naval changes in our Commonwealth. On January 1, the British Imperial flag-ship Drake left for England. The Commonwealth first-class Dreadnought cruiser, Australia, replaces her. The Sydney station is to be transferred by Admiral Sir George King-Hall to the Commonwealth authorities on July 1st, but in the meantime, preliminary changes are being made. Sir George remaining in charge until the end of June, when his successor will assume control of what will be the basis of a purely Australian fleet unit."

"In addition to the cruiser Australia, the Commonwealth fleet will include the second-class cruisers Sydney and Melbourne. Until the third Australian second-class cruiser Brisbane is constructed the Commonwealth is to have the use of the H. M. S. Encounter, which is to be lent by the British admiralty. In addition to those four cruisers, three destroyers (Parramatta, Yarra, and Warragee) will form part of the fleet, while three other destroyers are to be built as soon as practicable. Then, there are also due a number of submarines that are in the course of construction in English shipyards.

"The whole will form the nucleus of the Australian fleet of the future, and it is hoped that by July 1st the Australian station will be complete, with the possible exception of the destroyers section. Diplomats state that the South African Commonwealth is keeping parley with the growth and progress of her Australian sister, and that the cost of construction of their warships and of their upkeep does not to any extent enter into the patriotic spirit of those sister colonials.

James Lowther. Rt. Hon. James Lowther, who has been speaker of the British house of commons since 1905, was born April 1, 1855. He is a son of William Lowther who was a member of parliament for a quarter of a century. James Lowther was educated at King's College, London, and Trinity College, Cambridge, graduating from the last named institution with high honors. In 1879 he was made a barrister; in 1891 was undersecretary for foreign affairs, and the following year represented Great Britain at the international conference at Venice. He is a Tory in politics and has been in parliament since 1883. Before attaining the speakership he was deputy speaker and chairman of the committee of ways and means. He is a member of the Privy Council.
