The series of trips mapped out by the Commercial club will help a great deal towards informing the business men of the city of what is going on about them. As an instance, the Standard Oil company plant is reported to be one of the most complete branches of this tremendous corporation that there is in the northwest; the Nordak Creamery company have greatly enlarged and bettered their quarters and are doing a business which will reach into many hundreds of thousands of dollars this year, the first year they have been in business here; there is not one man in twenty in Bismarck who realizes what an extensive plant the Bismarck Comulsion company has, nor of what an extensive business Mr. Hughes has quickly built up through his own efforts; The Capital City Bottling Works is another institution of which Bismarck can well be proud, and, according to the trade journal, Mr. Sell has one of the best bottling plants in the country, which is fully equipped with the latest machinery; The Bismarck Foundry company have another nice outfit and are doing a rapidly growing business and plan a considerable enlargement of the building this year to accommodate their growth. This High school, which will be the first place visited on this excursion, is an institution of which the city can be proud, having, as it does, a complete and modern equipment and a building exactly suited to its purposes.

The excursion will start promptly at 3 o'clock, from the club rooms, and every business man of the city is cordially invited to come there and join the party.

The Commercial club is going to have its hands full the coming month in entertaining the numerous conventions to be held in Bismarck in June. The first convention will be the State women's meeting and tournament, which will bring fully one thousand people here. There will be addresses by the leading thinkers in this line of work and the meetings will be of especial interest to the farmers of the surrounding country, of whom it is hoped there will be a large crowd in attendance.

A camp meeting ground has been arranged for southeast of the capitol building, on the level ground, and convenient to the Ninth street water main. Rev. C. J.
