Washington, July 11.—The administration plan for the government controlled federal reserve board to administer the entire banking system provided in the Glass currency bill was endorsed practically without any amendment by the democratic members of the senate banking and currency committee. After discussion it agreed on the proposed plan of \$10,000 yearly for each member of the board. The democratic of the committee adjourned until Monday.
