SHOT WIFE AND LEFT BODY IN OLD STRAW PILE

Fargo, Nov. 14.—John Stock, a well to do farmer residing a short distance from Kent in Wilkin county was arrested yesterday on the charge of murdering his wife. Mrs. John Stock's body was found Wednesday evening near a straw stack a short distance from her home, with a bullet hole in the head. She disappeared from her home eight days ago, and at that time foot play was feared. A systematic search has been kept up since her disappearance.

Mrs. Stock is the mother of John War was of this city and he was notified of the finding of the body of his mother and left for her late home yesterday morning. The dead woman lived in this city until about three years ago when she married Mr. Stock. Suspicion pointed to the husband's guilt, owing to the mistreatment it is alleged he accorded her on numerous occasions.

New Way to Make Apple Dumplings

Served With Hard Sauce or Cream and Sugar

Here is a new way to make apple dumplings that will surely please every housewife, for it is not necessary to have whole apples, and the juice cannot run out and burn as with apple dumplings where the apple is placed in the center and the dough turned up around it. The biscuit part forms a crispy shell that holds the apples and juice.



K C Apple Dumplings
One and one-half cups sifted flour; 1/4 teaspoonful salt; 3 level teaspoonfuls K C Baking Powder; 1/4 cup shortening; about 1/4 cup milk; apples.
Fill the cups of a buttered muffin pan with pared and sliced apples, sprinkle with salt and turn two or three tablespoonfuls of water into each cup. Sift together, three times, the flour, salt and baking powder; work in the shortening, and mix to a soft dough with the milk. Drop the dough from a spoon with the apples in the cups, giving a smooth exterior. Let bake about twenty-five minutes. Invert the pan on a large serving dish. Put a spoonful of hard sauce above the apple in each dumpling and finish with a grating of nutmeg.

MANDAN FARMER MEETS DEATH IN FRONT OF TRAIN

Mandan, N. D., Nov. 11.—Frank Dolan, aged 25, was instantly killed when he was struck by passenger train No. 6 Friday morning as the train was pulling into the west end of the switch yards. Dolan was a farmer near Harmon, and during the early part of the evening was seen in several places at Mandan in a badly intoxicated condition. As No. 6 pulled into the yards he was seen to step from behind one of the posts of the viaduct directly in front of the train. Both his legs and arms were broken in several places. His head was caved in over his eyes and his body was terribly cut and bruised. An inquest was not considered necessary. No arrangements will be made for the disposition of his remains until his sister, Mrs. Mary Freudenberg, of Moorhead, Minn., is heard of. He was a single man, and was well known in Mandan.

NIMROD IN BAD OVER CHICKEN

Jamestown, N. D., Nov. 14.—Blond Blom, of near Fred, was arrested on the charge of shooting a prairie chicken out of season and in a hearing in justice court was fined \$25.00, which included the costs Blom pleaded guilty, but claimed he shot the bird because it was crippled. He is now a guest of the sheriff.

HUNT ARRESTED ON SERIOUS CHARGE

Jamestown, N. D., Nov. 14.—Ove Hunt, a resident of Illinois, who has been an employe at the state hospital for the insane, has been taken by Deputy Sheriff Russell Wright to McLeansburg, Illinois, being summoned to that state on a warrant charging him with rape. He accompanied the officer without the necessity of a requisition.

SPECIAL INSPECTOR FOR CANADA CATTLE

Pembina, N. D., Nov. 14.—On account of the large number of Canadian cattle being shipped to the market on this side since the removal of duties has made it necessary to have a special inspector at the port of entry in Pembina county. A special train carrying 400 head has just been shipped from Alberta to the Chicago market.

THREE MEN HELD FOR BURNS DEATH

Carrington, N. D., Nov. 14.—Three men who went from this region to the Great Lake district of Saskatchewan last May with John Burns, are held by the mounted police suspected of being implicated in Burns' murder last August. The men held are Oscar Nelson, John Hagen and Martin Johnson. The Canadian officers admit the evidence is not strong enough against any of them to warrant holding them longer for an examination, and the police have written here several times for information on different matters. They state that Burns was to have received some money in a quarter section of land, and the money is supposed to have arrived about the time of his murder. The police also state that it has been established that Burns was killed by a blow on the head and then thrown in the well at five o'clock when his body was found nine weeks after.

SCHOOL QUESTION UP

Medina, N. D., Nov. 14.—The residents of two townships in the western part of Stanislaus county will vote next week on the consolidation of the schools. The county superintendent has received a petition asking that the town of Medina be set aside, as far as school purposes go, from the two townships in question.

CLUBS KEEP UP THE TOWN BOOMS

North Dakota Commercial Bodies Are Still Hustling
Grand Forks, Nov. 14.—Solution of the home trading question is the work taken up by the Devils Lake Commercial club, and which it anticipates carrying through to a successful conclusion. As a means of placing their campaign before the residents of Devils Lake, and the lake region territory adjacent to that city, the club has established several projects which will be carried out. The Devils Lake Commercial club also has taken up the question of improved railroad service, seeking to secure better accommodations over the Great Northern north to and from the Twin Cities, or Duluth. One plan calls for the extension of the line of the Grand Forks-St. Paul night service to Devils Lake, while another contemplates the extension of the Duluth-Grand Forks night service to that city.

WITH REASON GONE, BOY WANDERS ALONE ON DAKOTA PRAIRIE

After wandering aimlessly over the state for several days, a young boy named Otto Foster, of Minneapolis, was picked up by the Moorhead police Thursday morning. He had been in the city for the night and took the son with him to his home. The younger Foster disappeared from his home in Minneapolis several days ago.

Valley City, N. FIRE DEMOLISHES HOTEL AT OAKES
