MIDWINTER RIDE IS CAMPAIGN OF "TRIB" COWBOYS

Tired of waiting for the cold weather that does not come, the Tribune Overlanders today started out on a midwinter campaign through Burleigh county.

Yesterday four members of the band that last summer toured the state on horseback, saddled their horses and reported ready for another ride.

It was a novel sight to see the Overlanders dressed in the regulation cowboy costume get ready for riding in midwinter, but the weather was so mild that even the cowboy riding coats were thrown open.

The Overlanders plan to make a thorough canvass of Burleigh county in the next few weeks, then increasing their force to work the adjoining counties, continuing in the saddle all of next summer.

LIBRARY COMMISSION HAS ANNUAL MEETING

The North Dakota Public Library Commission met in regular session at their office in the capitol. There were present: A. E. Sheets of Lakota, president of the commission; Dr. O. G. Libby of the state university, and Superintendent E. J. Taylor of Bismarck. Mrs. Clara L. Darrow of Fargo was unable to be present, and R. A. Nestos of Minot was detained by a term of court.

The secretary gave a summary of the year's expenditures by months and by departments, and also a statistical summary of the year's work. Ninety-four new traveling library stations have been established in the past twelve months, and 38 new farmers' library stations. The supply of books is entirely inadequate for the old and new stations, and there is usually a file of 25 to 30 applications which cannot be filled without several months' delay.

The work of the educational reference department shows decided increase, there having been 2,699 borrowers of books who received 3,170 volumes; 48 clubs received a total of 319 volumes; 456 requests for information from the educational reference departments have received a total of 1,491 clippings and pamphlets. The total number of books and clippings sent from these two departments is 5,372. This does not include the 171 traveling libraries sent, which contain an average of over 40 books, nor the 60 farmers' libraries sent, containing about 15 books each.

The expenditure of the budget for the coming year was fully discussed, as were also the plans necessary in caring for the work of the legislative reference department during the next session.

As the commission meets only twice a year, it will not convene again until the second Tuesday in June, unless special business necessitates a called session.

BOY SAILOR COMES HOME

New York, Jan. 13.—Of philosophy there is much to be gleaned in the Seven Seas, which fact both Mr. Klipping and Kork Martini, "The Baby Boy," can attest, the former in even verse, the latter in a language that is part English and part pure invention. Most men spend a lifetime around Shanghai or up and down the North Atlantic coast before they can lay title to the name of sage, but "The Baby Boy" is only 15, and it has taken him just about three years to acquire a stoic outlook on life that accepts a good berth or an overhauling by the surgeon with equal fortitude.

Just at the present, Martini is at anchor, so to speak, in that haven for all good mariners, the American Seaman's Friend Institute, at No. 507 West street. His three years at sea and a better part of that time he has shipped before the mast, have not

passed without leaving their marks.

Banks the Seine.
The Banks, famous as a setting for sea stories, their fish and as a training ground for good sailors, were the scene of "The Baby Boy's" first encounter with deep water.

"I shipped on board the Arethusa, with Capt. Marrosey, in 1910," he said, "because the old man, my old man, lost his papers as a brakeman and our galley got kind of slim along with mother and the girls being merely passengers, most of the time, and us lacking able hands to work the ship. We made two trips to the bank for cod, but fishin' ain't exactly my lay, so I shifted at Halifax for a bang-up passenger packet with carpenter and rags and fancy gear that made me feel uncomfortable."

Ships on Bark.
With an opinion of human nature derived from a fishing schooner and a passenger packet, "The Baby Boy," who by then had added "Kid Cocktail" to his aliases, because of age and his real name, shipped aboard a Norwegian bark, the Auda, but not before he had served his time in the care of his skipper as a plain sick boy, for the life of a sailor requires somewhat more strength than a boy has to expend. Buenos Ayres, the Platte and Rosario contributed their share to his fund of knowledge on those runs and also snipped his health to such an extent that he had to go into dry dock in a hospital in Hull for about a month before he recovered and underwent the final hardening process that enabled him to return to the sea.

Back to America.
When he was well again "The Baby Boy," learned in the ways of the sea, and skilled in the ways of the boarding house keepers ashore, shipped on one sailing vessel after another until he landed in Christiania, a month ago, and applied for passage to the American consul there back to New York. He arrived here on board the Hellig Olav of the Scandinavian-American line, several days ago.

There's a scar on "The Baby Boy's" head. "In the South Seas," he said, "it happened when some big lubber ran against me outside a saloon. He got me first."

"One Swede ran amuck," he continued, "aboard the Andrews, out from Hull, to Sydney, and, 'cause I laughed, tried to fill me full of lead." This particular Swede succeeded only in so far as his bullets almost broke a bone in the "Baby Boy's" right leg. "Didn't blame him none, neither," concluded the "Baby Boy."
