BIG GRIST IN BENSON COURT

The annual report of the states attorney of Benson court, just filed with the attorney general, shows that fifty nine criminal cases have been instituted in that county. Two of these cases were dismissed by the states attorney, two were acquitted upon trial, and three dismissed on preliminary examination, while the remaining fifty-two show either a conviction upon trial or a plea of guilty. This is one of the best showings in the state and speak well for the states attorney for that county, Thos. H. Burke, of Minnewaukan, N. Dak., who conducted all of the cases without assistance.

ADVENTISTS MEET IN MINNEAPOLIS

JAN. 27 TO FEB. 3 ARE DATES SET FOR CONFERENCE IN MINNEAPOLIS.

The North Dakota conference of the Seventh-day Adventists will be well represented at the biennial session of the Northern Union conference of that denomination, which will be held in Minneapolis, Minn., January 27 to February 8. Elder S. H. Jackson of Jamestown, president of the conference, will head the delegation from this state, which will be composed of practically all of the clergymen and Bible teachers in its employ. Among others who will attend from this conference are: Carl Lear, A. V. Rhodes, N. M. Jorgenson, J. J. Reisinger, J. H. Seibel, Martin Olson, W. A. Alway, J. B. Clymer, Olat Rouning, M. Ruskier, Mrs. Bertha Jorgenson, and others. Among the cities that will be represented are: Harvey, Lincoln, Jamestown, Fargo, Valley City, Bowdon, Grand Forks, Rock Lake, Upham, and other places.

Also attending the convention will be clergymen and Bible teachers from the conferences in South Dakota, Iowa and Minnesota, which, with North Dakota, comprise the Northern Union conference. The visiting clergymen will include Elders A. G. Daniels, president of the General Conference; I. H. Evans, president of the North American Division conference; W. A. Spicer, secretary of the General conference; G. B. Thompson, secretary of the North American Division conference; W. W. Eastman, head of the publishing work in North America; and Meade McGuire, field secretary of the Young People's Missionary Volunteer organization. All of these are from the world's headquarters of the denomination in Washington, D. C. With the exception of Elder McGuire, who comes from Loveland, Col. Elder Charles Thompson, of Minneapolis, president of the Northern Union conference, will have charge of the meetings.

This will be the fifth of twelve similar meetings which will be held in different parts of the United States and Canada, and which will continue until next May. One will follow close on to the previous session, and it has been planned for the preachers from Washington to attend all of these sessions. Practically every preacher in the denomination in North America will have attended one of another of these meetings before the series closes.

A ministerial institute will be the program for the first week, with Elders Daniels, Evans and Thompson taking leading parts. These three ministers will be the instructors, and their subjects will be as follows: "The Ministry," I. H. Evans; "Spiritual Power," A. G. Daniels; "The Bible and Prayer," G. B. Thompson. Elder W. A. Spicer will lecture on "Foreign Missions." Professor Benson will also give some instruction concerning the development of the young people's department. It is stated that there are now over 20,000 young men and women in the schools, academies and colleges operated by the denomination, and the necessity of winning every one of these for gospel workers will be brought to the attention of the delegates. Elder Eastman will tell of the progress that is being made in North America toward distributing Christian literature. During the last week of the session business affairs will be transacted. Reports will be given by President Wight, the secretary, the treasurer, secretaries of the Religious Liberty, Sabbath School and Young People's departments, presidents of the various state conferences and other officials. Officers will be elected for the next year, credentials and licenses issued, and it is probable that several changes will be made in the forces in different parts of the Southern Union territory.

JAILED 17 YEARS BY DOCTOR'S ERROR

Springfield, Ill., Jan. 19.—After nearly seventeen years in the penitentiary at Joliet, evidence that he was convicted on an improper diagnosis today resulted in a communication of the sentence of Shilo McIntyre to expire next Saturday. He was sentenced to life at the January term of the circuit court of Warren county in 1896 on a charge of murder, growing out of an alleged attack upon Luella Merrill, a girl who was acting as nurse for his wife. Dr. W. E. Taylor, who performed the post-mortem on the girl, stated on inquiry that death was caused by peritonitis. He says now that the appendix was in a gangrenous condition.

CAR BREAKS THROUGH ICE

Carl Shenkenberg, proprietor of the Shenkenberg taxicab line, had a narrow escape from drowning yesterday morning when his automobile went through the ice on the Missouri river.

Mr. Shenkenberg and a passenger were crossing the river enroute to Flasher. They attempted the crossing near where men were cutting ice and two wheels of the auto broke through. Both men got out of the car safely and Mr. Shenkenberg returned to town afoot, got another machine, and sent a crew out to extricate the car. While attempting to free the auto from the ice it fell through entirely and was not pulled out until late in the afternoon.

INDIANA BARS MODERN DANCES

Bloomington, Ind., Jan. 19.—The tango, the fish walk, the kitchen sink and similar modern dances are barred from Indiana university, according to announcement made today by President William Lowe Bryan. The committee on student affairs will see that the rule against these dances is rigidly enforced. "I am not an expert on dances," he said, "but I know there is a right way and a wrong way to dance." The dance question was left to the students to solve last autumn and it was expected they would force the new steps out of use by the feeling of disrepute against them, but, instead, it became apparent that the modern dances were becoming the rage at the various student social affairs.
