It should be used very often these days, because it is a cheap, nutritious food, hence a good substitute for meat. Cheese had also a large percentage of fat, but is wholesome and completely digestible, although in the case of some people not easily digested. In the dietary of the armies of several foreign countries cheese takes the place of meat. As a breakfast dish it is delicious made into an omelette, for luncheon it may be baked with bread crumbs, after a beaten egg and a pint of milk have been added to a cupful each of cheese cubes and crumbs; for dinner it is excellent served with the salad course. And the praises of the Welsh rarebit need not be sung for the benefit of those who like a bit after the theater.
