**WESTBY CITY MARSHAL SHOOT TO PREVENT A SERIOUS TRAGEDY**

**Acted Just in Time to Bludge Old Offender From Injuring His Wife**

**While Loaded Up with Dago Red Started Commotion at a Dance**

Westby, N. D., March 4.—During the band boys' dance at Green's hall, the irrepressible Andy Reism, entered the hall about midnight and proceeded to make himself obnoxious to everybody in the place. Of course Andy was "stewed," but he knew what he was doing just the same. He attacked his wife, a poor hard working woman, and began to abuse her for some trivial thing. The fact of the matter is, that she is the sole support of herself and three or four children and was indulging in a week end recreation. Andy became so obstreperous at this juncture that City Marshal Smith, assisted by Ole Trowbridge, attempted to escort the couple to their home on the east side. When a short distance from the house Reism threatened to shoot Smith and Trowbridge and backed away a few paces in the dark, whereupon Marshal Smith whipped out an automatic and shot him. He was carried to his home, where a physician was called and upon examination it was found that the bullet went clean through a fleshy part of the leg above the knee. The wound was immediately dressed and the subject is now in a repose.

This is the second scrape Reism has been in within a short period and it was up to the marshal to protect the woman, whose life was in jeopardy, and also to protect himself.

**AGENT RECEIVES A FREAK LETTER**

Bob Morris the day ticket agent at the Northern Pacific depot, has a number of peculiar experiences every day just before the trains leave the city, but yesterday he was confronted with a matter that, he said, made him pinch himself to really see if he still lived.

Just before No. 7 pulled in yesterday some strange man rushed to the ticket window and thrust a letter to him. The letter was too deep for Bob and it was also too deep for attorneys, reporters and others then in the depot who had a chance to read it.

**Letter of Gift.**

"It was taken on or before the 4 day of Sept. A. D. 1913. By some persons; a delinquent caucasion. From the several protection's of the aforesaid. Resp. Yours, Frank A. Marquart, Mandan, N. Dak.

**ARKANSAS MURDER CASE.**  
Benton, Ark., March 4.—The case of Clarence Deweln and a man known only as "Joe" or "Shorty," both of whom are said to have confessed to

the murder of L. H. Thompson, who was slain here last November, is to be taken up by the grand jury which convened here today. The murder was one of the foulest crimes ever committed here. The victim, who was an aged commission merchant, was murdered for a small sum of money he had in his possession. One of the robbers held the aged man while the other beat his skull with a coupling pin. Deweln was arrested shortly after the crime and is alleged to have confessed. His alleged accomplice remains at large until a few weeks ago when he was found in Jonesboro, La. Deweln, who is not yet 21 years old, belongs to a respectable and well-to-do family in Belleville, Ill. His relatives have retained Charles P. Johnson, former lieutenant governor of Missouri, to defend him.

**SOCIAL UPEHAVAL AT JAMESTOWN**

Jamestown, N. D., March 4.—The case of the State of North Dakota vs. Mrs. Lottie George, was brought before Justice Murphy today and an affidavit of prejudice being filed the case was transferred to Justice Bigelow's court for a hearing. The charge is the slander of a woman, wherein the complainant, Miss Kate Mariner, swears that the defendant used slanderous language concerning her by applying to her epithets that were not only profane but likewise highly seasoned as to terms. In the absence of the states attorney, the case was continued, and when it comes up, the atmosphere of the court room is expected to be charged with intensity.

An incident in the preliminaries to the case is said to be a notice served on M. George, husband of the defendant, by Mr. friend to vacate a house. This led to a scrawl between the woman and the police report that a bucket of soot from a stove was thrown from the second floor of the house by Mrs. George, on the person of Mrs. Friend, and afterwards a pall of water was added to the decoration

**FIRE TRAGEDY INVESTIGATED**

**Minot Officers Think Death of Greeks in Flames is Suspicious**

**Think The Two Men who Perished were Murdered--Arrests Are Made**

Minot, N. D., March 4.—That Spiro Zivas and John Gianolus, Greek railroad laborers, may have been murdered in a small shack which was destroyed by fire on the Soo right of way, near the Henningsen creamery, is the belief of those who have investigated.

**Suspects Held.**  
Caruso Alexander and Gregorio Nardi were taken into custody and placed in the county jail to await investigation by the police. No charge has been lodged against them. Doctors who have examined the remains of Zivas and Gianolus stated that there were no knife wounds, but that the injuries to the head might have been inflicted with blunt instruments.

Alexander and Nardi have not worked for some time, according to their admissions. Nardi arrived in the city yesterday from Chicago, while Alexander came here from Utica, N. Y. Both men have been back and forth across the water several times and acknowledged no means of occupation. Neither would admit being connected with any Italian secret societies.

**Step Next to Victims.**  
Alexander and Nardi slept in the shack next to the one occupied by Zivas and Gianolus, but they escaped without injury. The shack in which they slept was burned to the ground.

The remains of the bunks upon which the victims slept were covered with splashes of blood, and on one there was a big clot of brains which had oozed out of one of the victims heads and gone almost through the excelsior exterior of the mattress. A small tin box which is believed might have contained money, which was seen early in the morning, has disappeared.

It is known that Spiro Zivas had upwards of \$500 on his person just a day or so ago, as he told his brother John about the money. His brother cautioned him against carrying so much cash about with him, but Spiro said that he was going to leave for the east in a few days and that he would then need the money.

**Visited by Strangers.**  
Spiro Zivas also told his brother John a few days ago that about a month ago several strange men had come to his shack for several nights and tried to gain entrance. At that time he feared for his safety. It is not known whether John Gianolus had any money or not. Gianolus had been uptown until about 10:30 and

probably arrived at the shack at about a quarter of eleven.

In speaking of both Zivas and Gianolus, Manson, who knew them personally, said: "They were among the best Greek boys in this vicinity. They always lived a good life and were honest and hard-working men. This thing is certainly a terrible shock to me."

**Greeks Shocked.**  
The Greeks of the city are stunned by the terrible fate which has fallen their countrymen, and they will undoubtedly aid in the investigation in every way possible.

Coroner Orsen Doe is working on the investigation with the police. Many called at the Rowan undertaking rooms to view the remains of Zivas and Gianolus. Both were at most burned to a crisp. Portions of the arms, legs and hands were burned away, and their bodies were terribly charred.

**Fire Loss \$300.**  
The shacks in which Spiro Zivas and John Gianolus were burned belonged to the Soo line, and as both were totally destroyed the loss is about \$300. The blaze was first discovered by Frank Switzer, who had been awakened by the whistle for the Dyer fire. He notified Bert Stewart, and together they turned in the alarm.

**READING-JERSEY CENTRAL CASE.**  
New York, March 4.—After a recess of two weeks the hearing was resumed today in the Government suit to dissolve the relations between the Reading Railway, the Central Railroad of New Jersey and their subsidiary coal companies. It is expected that the Government will complete its case this week.

**TAKEN FOR A DEER NEIGHBOR IS SHOT**

Winnipeg, March 4.—At a coroner's inquest held at Dauphin in connection with the fatal shooting of Michael Kuzyk on Feb. 23, Nicol Brattiko, a neighbor, admitted he shot Kuzyk, but stated his rifle was accidentally discharged. The evidence, however, went to show that he shot Kuzyk in mistake for a deer. Kuzyk had shot the deer and was skinning it in the bush when shot. Brattiko was placed under arrest for manslaughter.

**SEEKS \$100,000 AS HEART BALM.**  
Port Clinton, O., March 4.—The most notable breach of promise suit in the history of this section of Ohio came up for trial here today in the Ottawa county court. The suit was started four years ago by Miss Christina Pauls, who seeks \$100,000 damages from John Magee for failure to carry out an alleged promise to marry her. The defendant is an aged banker of Elmore and one of the wealthiest men in the county. Miss Pauls was employed for many years as a servant in the Magee household.

**DEMOCRATS ARE QUARRELLING OVER PICKING OF THE PLUMS**

Fargo, N. D., March 4.—That the patronage distribution problem is likely to prove a rock upon which the democratic ship of state in North Dakota is to meet destruction is the belief of many politicians of the state. That a bitter fight is on in the party over the distribution of the federal plums is admitted by leading democrats.

Leading democrats from several localities in North Dakota have been held in the city the past few days and numerous conferences have been held. The subject up for consideration was the appointment of a successor to James Shea, the present United States marshal for North Dakota. Shea's term of office expired Feb. 18, but he is still holding on and no one has as yet been appointed to fill the place.

And the reason for this is said to be the inability of the factions of the democratic party to agree upon a candidate. At the present time, it is said that the matter will be settled soon. State Chairman D. H. McArthur is now on his way to Washington to confer with President Wilson and, it is believed, to protest against the appointment of Doyle of Carrington, whose name, it was reported, had been sent to the senate by the president a few days ago.

It is said that the machine element of the party has decided upon the

appointment of Doyle, while the other faction which is said to be headed by the state chairman, is favoring Collins for the position. It has been declared by local democrats that if either of these men is appointed there will be a fight by the opposing faction and a united party in this state will be out of the question from then on.

There have been rumblings of this outbreak ever since that "love feast" which was recently held in Minot. This has now developed into an open fight and the scene of action has shifted to Washington. Rumors have now reached Fargo that former Governor John Burke has withdrawn from the fight and will take no part in the controversy from now on. It is also rumored that Hellstrom has withdrawn as a candidate for marshal in this state and that he is favoring a dark horse for the position if this can serve to bring peace into the country.

It has been admitted by leading local democrats that a compromise candidate may be the only way in which the present unpleasantness can be cleared up and unity preserved among the faithful of the Flickertail state. But so tense is the situation that even a compromise among the leaders is believed by some to be unavailing in this instance and that the party is in for a big fight.

**INDIAN SCHOOL NOTES.**

The average attendance during February has exceeded the rated capacity by 16, and applications for enrollment are still coming in. The opposite seems to be the condition at the sister school at Walpeta, yet congress has appropriated upward of \$20,000 for new buildings for that school during the fiscal year 1914.

Later, Judge J. F. Spaulding and Attorney C. L. Young each occupied an evening. They discussed phases of "Good Citizenship," and they treated the subject in a manner that good must result from their talks.

Last Sunday night the M. E. church choir favored the school with an evening's entertainment in song which was highly appreciated by all.

The school offers a standing invitation to singers, speakers, readers, etc., to exercise their talents at our choral exercises Sunday evenings.

Director O. W. Roberts of the weather bureau will speak on the 8th instant. He is expected to furnish the entertainment and the weather—good weather of course.


