

Lincoln Statue Built for Norway Nearly Finished (Continued from Page 1)

By Editor Thorsen of Normanden, at Grand Forks. This money was forwarded by W. Mogens Jensen, secretary of the Norwegian Forbundet at Christiania, and he will have charge of the purchase of the pedestal.

Erick Gude, a Norwegian architect, will design the pedestal and deliver it to the place where the bust will be erected in Christiania. Gude furnished the Buststone of Bjornson for the agricultural college campus and which is occupying a prominent place there.

Newspapers and periodicals of Norway are making extensive mention of this gift by North Dakota. The fact that the bust is the work of a farmer boy of this state and he a descendant of Norway himself is a matter of much pride to that country.

Governor Hanna on behalf of North Dakota will present this gift to the Norwegian people with impressive ceremonies July 4, at which time it will be unveiled. An exhibition will be held in Christiania this summer and it is expected that most of the people of that country will visit the capital city in course of the season.

Paul Fejdel, is now in Chicago putting the finishing touches to his work and it is expected that the judges will pass upon it in a short time. It will then be cast in bronze, after which it will be shipped to the Norwegian capitol, Fejdel's home is in Balley City. His fame as a sculptor is rising and the people of the state are expecting great things from his native son.

Farmers' Institutes Over State Were a Success (Continued from Page 1)

a close third. Under the general theme of cattle or livestock, dairying and beef production claimed equal attention. Other topics more or less demanded were: Weed Control, Tree Culture, Farm Management Cooperative Marketing, Sanitary Farm Homes, Rural School Improvement etc. It is a noteworthy point that in not a single instance was an institute lecturer called upon to discuss wheat production.

The North Dakota farmers are unanimous in their opinion that the days of exclusive wheat growing have passed; that a different system of agriculture must be established; that this new system shall be one of diversification in which corn, wheat, alfalfa, dairying, beef and pork production shall find a place.

Two crops were kept in the field during January, February, and the first half of March. One hundred and sixty four sessions were held with a total attendance of nearly 20,000 people. The lecturing force was made up in part of some of the state's most successful and progressive farmers among whom were J. E. Eastgate of Larimore, Frank Sanford of Valley City, and John Christianson of New Salem. Others who rendered most excellent service were Gordon W. Raddlett superintendent of farmers' institutes; W. R. Laxson, superintendent of Bettinger substitution; A. P. Hollis, extension lecturer; Max Pfander, assistant superintendent of the Mandan station; I. R. Waldron superintendent Dickinson substitution; W. C. Palmer, agricultural editor; W. R. Flint, and E. A. Greenwood of the state dairy commission and members of the better farming section of the expert station.

With no heavy storms to blockade either wagon roads or railroads, with an excellent corps of lecturers, with the best of interest and spirit on the part of the people only the best of results could be obtained. The farmers' institute is one of the pioneer educational forces of the state. Its promoters have ever been active and alert. Its meetings have always been inspirational as well as educational.
