TODAY'S MENU. BREAKFAST: Orange Juice, Prepared Cereal and Cream, Hamburger, Steak Rolls, Coffee. LUNCHEON: Roast Beef Hash, Baked Potatoes, Peas, Raspberry Jam, Cake Tea. DINNER: Quick Egg Soup, Baked Shad, Cream Onions, Sweet Potatoes, String Beans, Sliced Tomatoes and Cucumbers, Orange Jelly.

Quick Egg Soup.—Str 2 teaspoonfuls of beef extract into 1 quart of boiling water, add 1 grated onion, 1-2 teaspoonful of celery seed or a little chopped celery, 1-2 teaspoonful of salt and 1-3 teaspoonful pepper. Strain contents until it reaches the boiling point, strain through a fine sieve and pour while hot into the well-beaten yolks of two eggs. Add 4 tablespoonfuls of cooked rice and serve at once.

The birth of the Princess on April 30, 1909, was hailed with great joy by the people of the Netherlands, since it fulfilled a long-deferred hope and assured the succession of the House of Orange to the Dutch throne.

The infant Princess was christened Juliana Louise Emma Marie Wilhelmina. The name of Juliana was given her in memory of Countess Juliana of Nassau, wife of Prince Frederick Henry, and mother of the two ranches of the House of Orange Nassau.

The name of Louise recalls Louise de Coligny, wife of William The Silent. The names of Emma, Marie and Wilhelmina are those of her grandmother and her mother.
