"The Dance of the Light God" a Panama-Pacific Exposition Spectacle

ONE of the most spectacular features of the Illumination of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition will be a huge aurora of colored lights spreading from a gigantic scintillator before the Exposition grounds on San Francisco harbor. The scintillator will consist of a battery of forty-eight thirty-six inch searchlight projectors fitted with colored screens. Nearby will be placed a huge steam engine which, instead of moving, will generate steam. At night the scintillator will project "The Dance of the Light God" upon clouds of steam and smoke generated by the engine or from boats burning in the heavens. Colored shafts of light will be projected from the scintillator.
