

STATE CAPITOL NOTES

EDITOR TOSTEVIN HERE. Editor Tostevin of the Mandan Pioneer was at the capitol Thursday in consultation with State Printer Thompson regarding matters relating to the state printing.

ELECTRIC COMPANY.

The Wimbledon Electric company has been chartered by the secretary of state. The company is capitalized at \$10,000, and will furnish light and power for the town. The incorporators are F. H. Etter, H. E. Etter, H. H. Etter, A. E. Dennessted and R. Clendinning, all of Wimbledon.

ANOTHER BIG CLEANING.

At a meeting of the State Auditing Board, held in the Governor's office Thursday, a resolution was offered by the governor and adopted to pay bonds to the amount of \$25,000, from the sinking fund of the state. The bonds that will be retired under this resolution are a part of the Refunding Capitol Building Warrants Bonds which were issued May 1, 1897, and which are due May 1, 1927.

The payment of these bonds at this time will release \$25,000 from the sinking fund and make that much money available for the purpose of loaning to the school districts of the state which are building new school houses and wish to issue bonds and the board of university and school lands has many applications for money for that purpose.

This makes a total of three hundred thousand dollars of state bonds re-

tired within the last six months and reduces the bonded debt of the state from \$937,000 to \$687,000, which is the lowest it has been since statehood, and makes the per capita indebtedness of the state less than \$1.

TO LISBON.

Governor Hanna and Superintendent Taylor left Thursday afternoon for Lisbon where they will address a large class of graduates today. There are upwards of 130 graduates from the eighth grade, who will participate in the exercises today.

FIRE MARSHAL RETURNED.

Fire Marshal Runge has returned from Rugby and Park River, where he was looking after the razing or removal of three old shacks of buildings in each town, which he had ordered dispensed with. A. U. S. MAIL BOX.

Uncle Sam has discovered the capitol, and evidently come to the conclusion that it is a pretty good patron, for on Thursday he placed a large mail box in the corridor for the collection of mail. It is a combination box for packages and letters. The mail is to be collected three times a day—one in the forenoon, twice in the afternoon. It is alright for the ordinary mail, but when the departments bring it by the several armfuls it will not hold one-fourth of the deposit.

KANSAS CITY TO HAVE BIG MEET

SOUTHERN BRANCH OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH HOLD BIG MEETING.

CONTRIBUTIONS ARE LARGE

Members From All Parts of the South Will Be Present At Conferences.

Kansas City, Mo., May 21.—Christian education will be the keynote of the fifty-third assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church that convened here today. The ad interim committee on education appointed by the assembly of 1913, is expected to make recommendations which, if adopted, will revolutionize the educational policy of the church.

Reports of Committees. The report of ad interim committee on the proposed union of the United Presbyterian church and the Southern Presbyterian church, will also come before the assembly for action.

The first event on today's program was the opening sermon by the Rev. J. S. Lyons of Louisville, Ky., the retiring moderator. Upon the election of a new moderator the Rev. Mr. Lyons will retire. The assembly will close its meeting May 28.

Will Elect Moderator. A new presiding officer will be elected as a moderator each year and to preside over that assembly only, and no moderator can succeed himself in office. The two officers of the assembly who have succeeded themselves from year to year for a number of years past are Rev. T. H. Law, D. D. of Spartanburg, S. C., the stated clerk, and the permanent clerk, Rev. J. D. Leslie of Cisco, Texas.

Many Great Preachers here. The prominent preachers who will be heard during the sessions, include the Rev. Egbert W. Smith, D. D., and the Rev. John I. Armstrong, D. D., Nashville, Tenn.; the Rev. S. L. Norris, D. D., Louisville, Ky.; the Rev. A. L. Phillips, D. D., and R. E. Macmill of Richmond, Va.

No report to be submitted will be heard with greater interest or will be of greater importance than the report of the Committee on Education, Rev. Henry H. Sweets, D. D., of Louisville, Ky., chairman and one representative from each of the fourteen Synods of the Assembly constituting the Committee, which held a conference during the summer of 1913. This report deals with schools, colleges, universities, and theological seminaries with reference to church connection, standardizing financial problems, loan and scholarship funds and the need of arousing the church on the subject of Christian Education. mentations of this report are stated to be definite and concise.

Want New Synod. Another interesting subject to come before the assembly will be that included in an overture from the Synod of Virginia recommending the erection of a new Synod, to be known as the Synod of West Virginia and to include all of the State of West Virginia, part of which territory is now included in the Synod of Virginia. The erection of another Synod, familiarly known as the "Mountain Synod," will no doubt receive consideration also.

Southern Contributions. The amount contributed by Southern Presbyterians during the year just closed for foreign missions was \$361,179, and for home missions \$168,670. The amount contributed for home missions was an increase of \$14,496.

The Woman's Council, the auxiliary to the Assembly will be in session simultaneously with the Assembly. While not a law-making body the council is a strong factor in the work of the church. Mrs. W. C. Winsborough of Kansas City, is its secretary.

SUNDAY TRAVEL IS FORBIDDEN

King, George, Nor; Any Member of Royal Family Will Desecrate Sabbath.

Chicago, May 21.—King George of England has established the rule for himself and his family never to travel on Sunday unless it is "absolutely necessary. Would that in our country the high officials of our own government, some of them professing Christians, would adopt the same rule and set an example to the American people. Alas, it is not so at present."

The Committee on Sabbath Observance of the Presbyterian General Assembly, in session here, drew this contrast today in its report. The results of twenty-three years' work of the Sabbath Day Observance Committee were laid before the assembly. The committee found cause for rejoicing in the passage of Sunday rest laws by forty-seven states, but issued a circumstantial rebuke to the management of the Panama-Pacific Exposition for planning to open its gates on Sunday.

A number of Sunday observance organizations seriously meditated refusing to take any part in the ten days' Lord's day conference to be held at the Panama-Pacific Exposition, it was declared in the report, on account of their repugnance to the exposition plan to "keep open" Sunday.

Oppose Sunday Opening. "There was hesitancy, the report asserted, "on the part of some organizations to participate in a congress in connection with an exposition the gates of which would be open on Sunday but in view of the fact that California is the only state without a Sabbath law and in the hope that the congress would be influential in obtaining the passage of such a law the Lord's Day Alliance decided to take part in the congress, reserving however the right to enter resolutions of protest against having the exposition open on Sundays."

The exposition thus far has not asked for a government grant, it was declared in the report in order that the government might not make Sunday closing a condition of its support.

Urged Not to Shop. General adoption of a Saturday half holiday as giving opportunity for preparation for the Sabbath was advocated in the resolutions which closed the report. Families are urged not to buy anything on the Sabbath, to refrain from reading Sunday papers and to facilitate the religious observances of servants. The assembly is recorded as requesting the faculties of colleges and seminaries not to schedule any recitations for Monday mornings in order that students may not be tempted to use Sundays to prepare such work.

Seven Day Laws. Under the head of victories during the year the committee called attention to the passage by New York and Massachusetts of one day's rest in seven laws. Modifications of these laws are contemplated in bills introduced or about to be introduced, declared the report, which urged Presbyterians to take a firm stand against any weakening of the acts. The record of observances of the Sabbath included such diverse mentions as that of New York prison keepers taking one day off every week, and 160,000 London, England, milkmen petitioning their customers to be contented with one delivery Sunday morning.
