

## GIRL EXPERT ON BUTTER

### PEACEFUL FARMERS' CLUB NEAR ROSS IS DOING FINE WORK

### 100 FAMILIES ARE MEMBERS

Owens Its Own Hall and Barn—Is Recognized Leader in the Community.

State Dairy Commissioner Flint returned yesterday, from attending a dairy meeting at the hall of the Peaceful Farmers' club, five miles from Ross. The club is only four years old, but it is doing excellent work. It owns its own hall, which is 24 by 42 feet, with an adjoining room 24 by 28 feet.

More than 100 families are members of the club and music is furnished by a farmers' band of 18 pieces. One of the features of the exercises which Mr. Flint attended was a reading of a paper on "Butter on the Farm," by Vernia Zimmerman, a Seventh grade student.

**Shows Work of Club.** As indicative of what the club tries to teach we reprint the paper here. It reflects what is being done to educate the rising generation in farm work, making them more content to stay on the farm when they realize the advantages of scientific, modern dairying and farming. It follows:

**Can Make High Grade.** It is possible for the farmer to make the highest possible grade of butter on the farm, owing to the fact that he has the entire control of the milk from the time it is drawn until it is turned out a finished product, ready for market. Especially is this true where the farmer has a small separator.

**Color of Straw.** If the cream has proper care and is ripened just right before churning it will be good butter when churned. The color should be about the color of a straw. If the butter is good it should have a clean, milky, rich, creamy flavor.

Next in importance to flavor is body. Butter that is greasy, tallow, spongy, or sticky, is undesirable. The body must be firm and uniform. The butter must not be streaked or mottled.

**Salt is Important.** The amount of salt depends upon what the market wants. Some people

don't like the butter so salty and some do. The salt must be thoroughly dissolved and evenly distributed. Medium salting is not desired.

**Style of Butter.** By the "style" of the butter is meant the appearance of the butter and the package. It should be clean and neat, as whoever buys the butter will be well pleased, but they won't take butter that smells badly or that looks streaky.

If the farmer can furnish an even grade and a regular supply of butter the year around he can, with a little effort, readily find an excellent market.

**Prefer It Direct.** People living in towns and cities generally prepare to buy direct from the farmer if possible, and are willing to give the farmer his price. The reason the people in towns and cities want butter from the farmer is because they get it fresh. Those who have separators can take care of the cream better than those that have not. They had rather have butter from those that have separators.

**Value of Pork.** Besides the "income" derived from butter sales, the by-products fed to calves and pigs are steadily increasing the value of young beef and pork. The buttermilk, if fed directly after churning is always productive of good results, as the chance of fermentation or contamination, are fewer than in the creamery, and consequently it gives better results as a feeding ration.
