CHOPPED FEED. When in doubt, tell the truth. Poor shingles are too dear at the price. Many a golden opportunity become a pewter reality. England's Ulster is uncomfortably warm this weather. The two-handed manure spreader is a lot better than none. Why not raise a crop of flax on the old pasture this season. "Early and often" is the successful corn grower's cultivation motto. It's cheaper to fill the old well with dirt than with a three year old coil. Laws do not make us; we make laws and meat them to our purpose. "I was sick, but well again" hen is not the one that fills the egg basket. It is time to suggest that most 4th of July accidents need never happen. This is the time to watch the health of the sheep, and, more especially the lambs. Good health is like the fish that got away—one talks about it most after it has gone. Why not take a day off to visit the school, and encourage both the children and teacher. In order to make the hay engine work efficiently one must feed his horses good clean hay. Oats and peas sown together make a good extra hay crop, and it is not yet too late to put it in. A few sheep make an excellent substitute for a lawn mower when one is too busy to use the latter. When we have good roads, competing competitive markets the farmers will be the first to benefit by them. One variety of potatoes on a farm or in a neighborhood means a more satisfactory crop at better prices. The drainage deepens the feeding ground of the crop, and insures the farmer against both drouth and flooding. Cultivate, not to kill the weeds, but to hold the moisture. The end reached will be the same, and the labor less. The beauty of good deeds deserves praising, but that is no reason why one should neglect his personal appearance. Hay slings and a loader are among the tools that cut down the cost of hired help by making that help more efficient. What is the reader's experience with "change about butchering"? Does it work well, and how do you manage it? The first essential of good seed corn is that it will ripen where grown. Soggy, immature corn is land-and-labor waste. What is the Northwest going to do with its increased corn crop? One good way is to can it in the silo and feed it out on the farm.

MEETINGS ARE SUCCESSFUL

Many Converts Made and the Entire Camp is Alive With Spiritual Interest.

Thursday morning "in the camp," started out bright and early with the six o'clock prayer meeting. This prayer meeting was the best attended of any held so far. It was due to the "sargeant-at-arms" committee which goes around and wakes every one at 5:30, so as to be ready for the meeting at 6:00.
