DROWNED IN CANNONBALL. Mandan, June 27.—Henry C. Anderson, aged 28 years, was drowned late last evening while bringing election returns to the city from Cannonball township.

Anderson was enroute from the Cannonball precinct to Leith with J. W. Good. They attempted to cross the Cannon Ball river about five miles south of Leith.

Good went first on a saddle horse and made the crossing. Anderson was in a buggy. In crossing the river he mounted the horse back. The animal lost its footing and went down, entangled in the harness so that it could not swim.

Anderson was thrown from the horse back and drowned. It is not believed that he could swim. Searching parties have been out this morning but have been unable to find the body of Anderson. The Cannon Ball river is rising rapidly from recent rains, and it is not believed that the body will be found until the river recedes.

Anderson was married and had made his home in the Jamesburg vicinity for many years.
