BATING RATING OF BOTH IS 342; TEN IN FIRST DIVISION.

PHILLIES LEAD IN CLUBS

Grant Tops National League With Score of 342.

Chicago, July 27.—"Home Run" Baker, Philadelphia, has pounded his way into a tie for the batting leadership of the American League. According to averages published here today, Baker and Cobb of Detroit are setting the pace at a rate of 342. In the first ten also are Jackson, Cleveland, 329; E. Collins, Philadelphia, 327; Crawford, Detroit, 323; C. Walker, St. Louis, 322; Kirke, Cleveland, 321; Fournier, Chicago, 313; Speaker, Boston, 308; A. Williams, Washington, 308; Philadelphia with 263 and Washington with 245 lead in club batting. Eddie Collins has tied Maise of New York in stolen bases with 32. In games won and lost, the best regular pitchers appear to be Leonard, Boston, with 3 and 3; Bender, Philadelphia, 8 and 2; and Pank, Philadelphia, 10 and 3.

Grant Tops Big League. Grant of New York tops the National League race with 342. Next come Becker, Philadelphia, 336; Dalton, Brooklyn, 331; Byrne, Philadelphia, 315; Meyers, New York, 310; Wingo, St. Louis, 305; Phelan, Chicago, 304; E. Burns, New York, 302; Samuel, Brooklyn, 302; Archer, Chicago, 302; E. Burns, Philadelphia, 302. Brooklyn is ahead in club batting with 266 and New York next with 265. Herzog, Cincinnati, leads in stolen bases with 25. Mathewson, New York, with 17 and 4; Vaughn, Chicago, with 11 and 4; and Doak, St. Louis, with 9 and 4, hold pitching honors.

Kauff Heads Federals. Kauff, Indianapolis, leads the Federals with 333 in batting and 41 stolen bases. In the upper ten among the hitters are Evans, Brooklyn, 375; Carr, Indianapolis, 367; Walsh, Eato, 357; McGuire, Chicago, 340; Lenox, Pittsburgh, 335; Easterly, Kansas City, 333; Crandall, St. Louis, 325; Bradley, Pittsburgh, 323; Shaw, Brooklyn, 323; Murphy, Brooklyn, 323. Indianapolis with 238 and Baltimore with 278 lead the clubs. Pitching leadership is held by Kniserling, Indianapolis, with nine wins and 2 defeats; Ford, Buffalo, with 12 and 5; and Seaton, Brooklyn, with 16 and 7. Titus Has Average of 393.
