FALSE IDEAS OF FARMING PROFITS

Writer in Farm and Fireside Points Out Fallacies Embodied by Amateur Farmer.

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside, the national farm paper published at Springfield, Ohio, Judson C. Welliver, Washington correspondent of that publication, published an interesting article in which he makes the assertion that a good-sized farm pays best—that is, the farm of large size as distinguished from the little farm. He proceeds to demonstrate his proposition, but before doing so he has a little fun with city people who swallow stories of being successful made on tiny farms. Following is an extract from the article:

Sounder Fine.

"Just the other day I saw one of these charming stories about a young man in Nebraska who has forty acres and was getting fabulously rich off it. But this story gave itself away. This young man raised them on the market ahead of anybody else in his region, and always sold at big prices. Of course the metropolitan farmers' who wrote editorial commendation of that man didn't stop to think that if everybody made a specialty of producing potatoes three weeks ahead of season, or if everybody raised half an acre of head lettuce, nobody would get any of the premium on early potatoes, and head lettuce wouldn't be worth as much as wheat straw baled out of a two-year-old pile. I had a friend who went to raising 'certified milk' on his suburban farm. 'Great enterprise,' he told me just at the time he was finishing the little business of spending \$18,000 on cement stables, modern plumbing for the house, and a herd of Jerseys every one of which was guaranteed to know her pedigree by heart, clear back to the Isle of Jersey. He was going to sell all that milk for 18 cents the quart.

It Didn't Pay.

"Well, I saw him again two years after he had installed this milk mint, and asked him about where he was depositing the profits. 'Did he have confidence enough in the banks to put such fat sums into them? He started and started on politics. His milk had cost him five cents a quart more than he could get for it.

During the same two years he was making this demonstration, another friend, raising common milk at 17 to 22 cents the gallon, had been receiving an average monthly milk check of \$820, living in a fifteen-room house and making his farm better all the time. He didn't know whether he had been making or losing money, but he had none in the bank, used a touring car, and had a son and a daughter in college."

HARVEST HANDS NEEDED

Department of Agriculture and Labor Receives Calls Soon or Than Expected.

Calls for harvest hands are being received quite regularly at the department of agriculture and labor. In many localities the crops have ripened quite fast and the demand has come a trifle sooner than expected. From New Rockford, in Eddy county, comes a call for 200 men within ten days. The letter says 100 men can find jobs as soon as they get there and the other 100 can come next week, as harvest has begun and is much earlier than usual for that county.

"MACHINE" RULE OUSTED IN CHINA

Political Machine Dominant for Past Ten Years Is Defeated By Reformers

Tokyo, July 30.—The political machine which for ten years has dominated municipal government in Tokyo was demolished by the reformers at the recent municipal elections. So serious was the reverse that the organization, which was known as the Tokiwakai, and which has been called "Tokio's Tammany," has been dissolved altogether.

A Signal Victory

The good government party regards the overthrow of the organization a signal victory, and indicative of the general reform movement which is sweeping over Japan in all branches of the political life. For the last ten years they had fought to eliminate the Tokiwakai majority in the municipal assembly, but each successive attempt met with failure, until this year they have not only removed the objectionable majority but also defeated its leader, S. Mori-kubo, in whom they saw all of the party's corruption personified. The charges were similar to those which have characterized so many municipal uprisings in America—harmful patronage, corruption in the distribution of contracts for public works and general graft.

Due to Younger Generation

The success this year was due largely to the younger element, which was organized into an anti-machine body. Public meetings were held and almost every means of political publicity utilized to arouse the voters to the urgency of good government. The election continued for three days, at the end of which the reformists had captured all but 21 of the 76 seats in the assembly, Mori-kubo, the ousted leader, thereupon invited his fellow victims to a meeting at which it was voted to dissolve the association.

The new organization now in power is known as the Municipal Government Club. They are not content with reforming municipal politics alone, however, and have already begun a vigorous campaign to establish themselves in the National House of Representatives, where the Seiyukai, or Conservative party will be the object of its attack. The Seiyukai has a large majority in the Diet, and since it was linked with the now defeated Tokiwakai, it appears to be in danger of losing its power. Likely to Dissolve Diet. The present Okuma cabinet is back-

ed by groups hostile to the Seiyukai. It would be carry through his program in the face of an opposing majority. Count Okuma would be likely to dissolve the Diet and give the people an opportunity to register their will at new election.

An interesting phase of the suffrage question was seen in the recent municipal elections. The suffrage is very restricted, there being three classes of voters, classified according to the amount of tax they pay.

Taking the city as a whole about one Lonesholder in thirteen has a vote. Each grade of voters elects 25 assemblymen. The voters of the first grade, number only 1,157. The second category has 6,138 electors. The great majority of voters, namely 69,248, but of the total of 67,371, are found in the third grade. To be qualified for this grade the citizen must pay a land tax or else an im-

perial tax to the amount of 2 yen yearly. Expressing Popular Will. The election of the assemblymen of third grade was regarded as most closely expressing the popular will. In every street leading to the voting booth the candidates had established committee rooms where there was a good deal of smoking and talking. Formerly tea and refreshments were at the disposal of the thirsty or hungry voter but today the government following the ideas of the West permits only moral suasion. The voter approached the quiet office of the election hall; gave his name and address and was supplied with a ballot. Another official checked and stamped the ballot. The voter then passed upstairs to the voting room where his ballot was again supervised. Finally he wrote the name of his candidate and handed over his ballot to the officials.

Blatherwick of Plaza, the present state champion, has participated in these games and last year retained permanent possession of the Wilton Business men's cup.
