TOURNAMENT ON LABOR DAY

Mixed Foursome Will Be Held, and Is Intended Especially For New Members.

A mixed foursome golf tournament will be held at the Country club Monday (Labor Day), starting at 10 a. m. RETURNED FROM EUROPE. Mrs. Kate Glaspell reached home, Jamestown Friday, from New York City, where she arrived a few days ago on the steamer S. Paul of the American line. Along with many other Americans who were unable to get different steamship accommodations, she came "steerage." A passage previously engaged on a Cunard line boat was surrendered, as she did not wish to take the chance of being captured enroute by German warships or encounter additional sea risk by running with all lights out after night and striking a stray iceberg. The steamship company made it as pleasant as possible for all the passengers on the trip, who were delighted to get out of the war zone of Europe and to cross the ocean under the protection of the American flag. Mrs. Glaspell reached London July 28, just before war was declared and she has met with many varied and interesting incidents since then, and heard the most harrowing experiences of other American tourists who engaged to get out of the continent after the war began. Mrs. McGillivray of Dickinson, who sailed for Europe with Mrs. Glaspell last January, returned to this country some time ago and is now reported visiting friends in Michigan.
