3—First Lieutenant E. P. Wing, is charged with the execution of Par. 1, of this order and will collect all United States and State property for which Captain A. B. Welch is responsible.

J. R. Joyce, a farm hand, employed near Emerald, will probably receive over \$30,000, as a result of a kindness which he showed a couple of Montana prospectors several years ago. The following item, which appeared in a Grand Forks paper, was the means of locating Joyce, and explains how he will probably be made a comparatively wealthy man.

"Spokane, Wash., Sept. 8.—One-third interest in \$100,000 awaits the finding of J. R. Joyce, a lumberjack, until recently employed in the vicinity of Newport, Wash., 65 miles northeast of Spokane. Several years ago Joyce grub-staked a couple of Montana prospectors to the extent of \$100 with the understanding that he was to be a third partner in their profits. The man made good and recently have disposed of their prospect for \$100,000. Joyce's share is being held in escrow for him in a Montana bank."
