SHORT COURSE OPENS.
Hammond, N. D., Nov. 4.—The first annual Short Course of the Benson County Agricultural and Training School will be held for eighteen weeks, beginning November 16.

This course is designated especially for boys and girls that cannot leave the farm until after the fall work has been finished. All persons over fifteen years of age may enter. Courses in agriculture, farm mechanics, cooking, sewing, household management, business English, and farm arithmetic will be offered. Tuition will be free and there will be no expenses other than the few dollars for books.

Glendive, Mont., Nov. 4.—"We have given him up for lost," said the son of J. D. Craycraft. Craycraft, a prominent citizen of Glendive, left here the first of the month on a hunting trip, and established a camp at the mouth of the Red Canyon.

On October 4th he started off after deer, and did not return at night. His friends searched for him, and after the third day, searching parties were organized, and which were continued to work incessantly since, despite the snow storms. They finally gave up and returned. Craycraft was a wealthy pioneer rancher of this district.

PEAT BOGS BURN.
Minneapolis, Nov. 4.—Fires in the peat bogs of Roseau county that may burn for years have started around the Thief Lakes country, according to William T. Cox, state forester, who returned from Roseau county today. He went to Roseau county to warn the settlers of the danger. If the fires get a good start, Mr. Cox says they will burn until the peat is entirely gone, and that nothing but bedrock and clay will be left. The value of the land will be destroyed, for it is useless without peat. The fires were started by settlers burning underbrush on lands, and since then the fires have spread over many acres. A number of ditches have been dug down to the bed rock in an effort to check the fires.

Stunted City Worker.
The stunted city worker has been discussed recently in a remarkable paper by an English inspector of factories. He contrasted the figures of the height and weight of 2,749 men reared in such industrial centers as Sheffield, Birmingham, Gateshead, Newcastle and Swansea, working at indoor occupations, with those of 400 navvies, iron workers and salmon fishermen, born and bred in rural districts and accustomed to outdoor callings.

He found that the average height of the indoor workers was five feet, five inches, and the average weight 10 stone. The average height of the outdoor workers was five feet, eight inches and the weight 10 stone 4 pounds.

Scotsmen were the tallest, and natives of County Kerry the heaviest. He declared that a considerable proportion of the working population was being artificially stunted to a grave extent.

He expressed the opinion that deterioration was largely a matter of poverty. Tea did more than was suspected to undermine the constitution of the industrial classes.

How to Banish Flies.
General Valliard, president of the health board of the French army, addressed the Royal Society of Medicine in London a few weeks ago on "Houseflies and Public Health." Among the most interesting things he said were those about the best methods of ridding houses of flies. After mentioning the traps and flypapers with which everyone is familiar, he spoke of pyrethrum powder as very active when fresh and pure. Milk containing 15 per cent of formalin is good, and fumigation with cresol ought to be more common, as it destroys mosquitoes as well as flies. This fumigation is especially useful in kitchens and stables.
