An Indian maiden from the land of the Dakotas took some excellent philosophy to the people of the east recently. The Brooklyn Times tells about it as follows:  
"Pocahontas-sweet, a young woman of the Dakota tribe, told a Brooklyn Institute audience last night some of the legends and customs of her people, and sang a few of the native songs. The little lecturer was most interesting, but the part which should have left the deepest impression was that in which Floating Cloud, as her name is translated, told of the Indian manner of greeting.  
"If we only said, 'Good morning, when we met a friend at sunrise,' she explained, 'we said it with a laugh; a genuine hearty laugh, not a mere lackadaisical smile. We thought that was the best way in the world to start the day. Try yourself beginning the day with a frown and the next day with a laugh, and see what a difference it makes.

**Arrested at Hillsboro for Stealing Buggy at Fargo.**



## FARM HOUSE BURNED.

**And Insurance Policy for \$1,000 Had Been Allowed to Lapse.**


Jamestown, N. D., Dec. 3.—I. L. Wohl, who resides in township 137, range 60, near Moorhead, met with a loss of a farm house by fire. He had previously taken out a policy of \$1,000 insurance with the James River Valley Mutual company, but had allowed the assessment to go by unpaid. The company had sent him a second notice of assessment and notified him of the lapse of the policy until said assessment was paid as provided by the rules of the company. The second assessment not having been paid, the policy still remained void and Mr. Wohl will be unable to collect the insurance owing to carelessness or neglect in keeping up the assessment payments.  
The company is obliged to follow out this plan in order to secure prompt payment of its assessments due from members.
