Will Participate in Christian Life Convention Program at the Presbyterian Church.

Fullerton, of St. Louis, who comes as one of the speakers at the Conference on Christian Life and Service which is in progress this week at the First Presbyterian church.

Given Highest Office.
Dr. Fullerton has been signally honored by the Presbyterian church of the United States by being chosen moderator of the General Assembly. The office of moderator of this assembly is the highest office within the gift of the Presbyterian church which indicates, in a measure, Dr. Fullerton's prominence as a preacher and leader.

Dr. Fullerton is western secretary of the Board of Home Missions. He is an unusually interesting speaker and his addresses form one of the most prominent features of the conference. All of the sessions of the conference are open to the public.

While the leaders are Presbyterians their messages are of inter-denominational interest and importance and a cordial invitation is extended to every one whether they be identified with any particular church or not.

The service tonight at which Dr. Fullerton speaks will commence at 7:30.
