AWAIT ACTION BY RUMANIA

Attitude of Nation Is One of Self-Interest; Friendly Both to France and Germany.

Bucharest, Mar. 8.—Newspaper organs of the various political leaders of Rumania are being closely watched by observers among the belligerent nations to learn which way, if any, the Rumanian army may eventually march. The press generally here is fashioned after that of France, having a distinctly personal tone, and the Rumanians generally wait for their particular leaders' opinion before they decide their own.


By our conviction that the Rumanians in Hungary ought to form part of a greater Rumania.

Mr. Mille thought it would be possible to arrive at an understanding with Bulgaria, admitting at the same time that Rumania could not well afford to engage in military operations against Austro-Hungary and Germany so long as the attitude of Bulgaria was doubtful.

That Rumania would eventually go to war was by no means patent to Mr. Mille. That will depend upon circumstances," he said.

"We are not greatly interested in the Rumanians in Bessarabia, because already they have been largely Russified. The Rumanians in Serbia and elsewhere are too negligible a quantity to be considered at present, though, naturally, we would like to have them form part of the nation we have made our objective."

Speaking of Rumania's relation to France and Germany, Mr. Mille said: "To France we are bound by ties of racial origin and intellectual life. Many of us have been educated there and feel that we have a sort of personal interest in the fate of the republic. At the same time we have in the past been the friends of Germany, are that even today to the extent which the relations of that country with Austro-Hungary permit this. I may say that I have no ill feeling towards Germany at all. Russia we have sincerely disliked during the last 30 years, or rather since 1878, when it took considerable territory from us. In Serbia we are not greatly interested, and our feeling towards Austro-Hungary is the result entire-

POSTMASTER IS AN EMBEZZLER

Fred W. Schmidt of Fort Rice Is Slated for Trial Here March 16.

While under indictment and due to stand trial before the federal court which convenes at Bismarck on March 16, Fred W. Schmidt of the Schmidt Drug and Mercantile company, postmaster at Fort Rice, is sought by government authorities who hold a warrant for his arrest on the charge of embezzlement of \$4,471.79.

Postoffice Inspector Gibbooney, who disclosed the alleged shortage this morning asserted that the books show a misappropriation of funds to the amount of \$4,471.79. He was willing that Schmidt should cover the shortage and knew of his trip to Wisconsin for the alleged reason given.

In a conversation over the long distance phone this morning, Inspector Gibbooney said: "This is not the first embezzlement. Four years ago there was a shortage of \$7,000. This was covered up. Later there was a shortage of \$1,400 and last year another shortage of \$1,300."

Both of these were replaced. However, Schmidt is under indictment now for a former embezzlement and I understand due to appear for trial on March 16. The government is, of course, not due to lose anything, as Schmidt has bonds with a bonding company. He has been given leeway in order to replace the money, but nevertheless will be prosecuted for the embezzlement by the government.

One county official and a prominent Ft. Rice man are on Schmidt's bond for \$500 each to insure his appearance before the federal court on March 16. In addition to this the same man are on notes of Schmidt's for \$1,250 and \$2,000. They have been given security, but not the kind that would bring face value at a forced sale of
