GETTING READY FOR NEW TAXES

Separate Listing of Moneys and Credits Will Be Made by Assessors.

The moneys and credits tax bill (H. B. 331) becomes operative July 1, next, and will be effective when the levy is made by the levying boards. But it is necessary, now, to have moneys and credits listed separately by the assessors when making the assessment in April and May. This means doing something to comply with this law before it becomes operative. Attorney General Linde has been asked as to the assessor's right to anticipate this law by having separate listings made of moneys and credits. The attorney general yesterday handed down the following opinion in which he states that this may legally be done: Separate assessment blanks for this class of property are being prepared. The following items appear on the blank: money, book accounts, mortgages, notes, shares of capital stock

of foreign companies and associations and bonds. Attorney General Linde's opinion with reference to this blank is as follows: "It seems to me that under the circumstances and in view of the fact that this law will not become operative prior to the 5th day of June or the 1st day of July, there can be no legal objection to a separate listing of moneys and credits. In other words, you propose to prepare for the law when it goes into effect by requiring separate listing of this class of taxable property. "It is my opinion that this can legally be done."

JACKSON'S PLEA ON PLAYGROUND

Baptist Minister Urges His Hearers to Stand Behind Playground Movement.

As a sort of a prelude to his sermon last Sunday night the Rev. Bruce E. Jackson of the First Baptist church spoke on the need of a public playground in Bismarck. A part of Mr. Jackson's remarks on this subject are printed below: "The twentieth century has fittingly been called the century of the child. One of the great forward movements which we have had in education in the past few years has been an ever-deepening and true appreciation of child life and an endeavor to begin with the child rather than with the material to be taught. We are all no doubt familiar with the fact that one of the great discoveries which has come to light in the earnest study of the child during the past few years has been the educational value of play. All over our country cities, communities and states have been taking steps through legislation and various other means to provide playgrounds and directors of play for our growing boys and girls. The results have been splendid. "There has been considerable discussion concerning this question in Bismarck. And I am glad to be able to tell you that steps have already been taken toward the foundation of a playground association for the city. Someone may say, however, "Does Bismarck need a playground?" In answer to that question I want to say that the person who thinks a playground unnecessary need only make a study of the childhood of the city and conditions here, to see very clearly the problem which parents and workers with boys and girls are confronting in their endeavor to keep the growing youth from contamination with the bad elements in the city and build up in them clean character. The sad fact has come to my attention more than once in the years in which I have lived here that boys have gone wrong not because they were bad boys but because in their idle hours they found no wholesome recreation in which they might engage, there was no direction for the pent-up energy within them and so in their restlessness they acquired vicious habits and went to pieces.

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PEN SCHOOL IS PROSPERING

Professor Gross of High School Is Superintendent of the Convict School.

The school work which is being carried on at the state penitentiary under the direction of Professor Gross of the commercial department of the high school, is resulting in much good to those who are taking up the studies. Professor Gross superintends the work, which is carried on three nights each week, and has under him one inmate principal and five inmate teachers. The average attendance is 52 men. Reading, writing, arithmetic, spelling and commercial law are the most popular subjects at the penitentiary school and there is one class in advanced grammar. Extra work in rhetoric, etc. is also being given to advanced students. The men who are in the advanced work classes are used as reserve teachers and altogether a good work is being done. The school was established at the penitentiary early in the year by Warren Talcott at the request of several inmates who were desirous of taking up some studies. The interest has increased until the present corps of teachers is none to great and outside help is called upon frequently.
