

A FULL HOUSE SUNDAY NIGHT

Aisles Were Crowded at Presbyterian Church; Jones Tells of Nicodemus.

Splendid audiences have greeted Jones and Burch every night during the past two weeks and the cumulative effect of their sermons in word and song was fully demonstrated Sunday night, when a crowd which taxed the capacity of the First Presbyterian church gathered to hear these Christian workers.

The Rev. Charles W. Harris, pastor of the church, spoke briefly prior to the sermon and expressed himself as highly pleased with the magnificent audience and in this connection said, "During my pastorate here at Bismarck we have had many eminent speakers, including such noted men as Booker T. Washington and Ogle Reed, but only once before in ten years has this church been so crowded as it is tonight and that was on the occasion of Mr. Jones' first visit to our city nine years ago."

Two Weeks Longer.

The meetings will continue every night this week and next with the exception of Monday, which is evening service. The service is reserved for the special interest and it was announced that Mr. Burch will sing, "Face to Face", by Johnson. Mrs. Burch will play the accompaniment on the piano.

Mr. Jones gave one of his strongest messages Sunday night, using as a basis for his remarks the third chapter of John's Gospel. The conversation between the Saviour and Nicodemus was related in a realistic way and in brief Mr. Jones said: "Dignity the cynic walked the streets of Athens at noonday with a lighted lantern, looking for a man, and the world has been looking for men ever since."

A Man With Backbone.

"In the first verse of this chapter we read that Nicodemus 'was a man,' and before the evening is over I hope to convince you that he was a man, not only in the generic sense, but in every sense of the word. He was a man of courage and of strong convictions, a man who dared to publicly and fearlessly pay tribute to Christ. We read that many of the chief rulers believed on Christ, but did not care to confess him for fear they would be put out of the synagogue. There are multitudes of men today who believe in Christ, just as these rulers did, but have never had the backbone to publicly confess Him."

Too Many Denominations.

"The first thing about this man Nicodemus worthy of our emulation is the fact that he went directly to Jesus. In this age of denominations and sects of every sort, we cannot too strongly emphasize the importance of going to Christ. Master once said, 'I am the door and he that climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber,' and yet our denominations are often magnified to the exclusion of Christ. There are 176 denominations in this country, 33 new ones in the last 25 years; Methodists are split into 16 divisions; Baptists have 12; Lutherans 23 and Presbyterians 15; and if a man gets balled up in finding Christ he is certainly entitled to some leniency."

Came With Questions.

"Nicodemus is not unlike many people of the twentieth century in that he came to Christ with hard questions. 'How can a man be born when he is old?' was one of the first things he said after he met the Saviour. The spirit of inquiry is to be commended, and yet many have allowed their quibblings to become a hindrance instead of a stepping stone to salvation. 'Oftentimes these questions are propounded to avoid the main issue and it has been my experience that if one is able to answer the quibbler's question, a dozen others are immediately forthcoming. A man once said to me that he didn't comprehend the divinity of Christ and in reply I said, 'I don't understand the humanity of man.'"

"If you ask me one question about the divinity of Christ which I am unable to answer, I will immediately ask a dozen questions about the most ordinary things of life which you cannot answer; a child could ask a hundred questions that would confound the most learned scientist. 'There lies a helpless little infant in the arms of its mother; it would die in a few hours without her care and protection, and yet the time may come when that child will rule a nation. As we contemplate this little child, its life is shrouded in mystery, not one would doubt its existence or its possibilities. 'So in this divine religion brought to us by Christ, we are confronted by many mysteries, and yet we behold daily many men and women who have been saved by His life and death. The greatest argument in favor of the Christian religion is a good man or a good woman.'"

SCHMIDT WINS FIRST POINT

Federal Judge Booth Sustains Demurrer of Counsel for the Defense in Conspiracy Indictment.

The defense in the case of the United States vs. Fred W. Schmidt, charged with conspiracy in connection with the embezzlement of funds from the postoffice at Fort Rice, Saturday afternoon in federal court demurred to the indictment and was sustained by Judge Booth. The other indictment against Schmidt for issuing postoffice money orders without receiving the money was continued over to the May term at Fargo. In sustaining the demurrer the defense incidentally won a dual victory inasmuch as this does away with the conspiracy indictment against Mrs. Lottie B. Solts, General Andrew Miller made the argument for Schmidt. He appeared in the defendant's behalf together with Attorneys Zuger and Nichols.

Equity Cases Now On.

With the disposition of one of the two indictments against Schmidt and the continuance of the other, this completed the cases on the criminal calendar for the present term of federal court, and the first of the four civil causes to be given attention was taken up yesterday afternoon when a jury was secured in the case of Pearce vs. Lape. This is a suit for damages arising out of the sale of land. First evidence was introduced in a special session of court last night. This and the other three cases will undoubtedly be handled with despatch and night sessions if necessary in order that the present term of court may expire on Wednesday in order to permit Judge Booth to be in Minneapolis the following day.

After Land Office Jobs in the State

In view of the fact that R. N. Stevens is soon to retire from his position as receiver of the land office here in order to enter into the practice of law at Mandan, there are several candidates after the government job. Among those mentioned for the local

land office position are: Joseph Mann of Washburn, Charles Giltchka, P. E. Byrne, F. L. Brandt, William Breene and James Campbell, the latter of Mandan.

Two men who are being named in connection with the land office at Dickinson are William Ray, Jr., of Dickinson and C. R. Maxwell of Mandan.

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
