The distinction of being the first automobile to climb Mount Hood, Oregon, as far as Rhododendron Inn in the month of January, was won on January 24 by the Hudson Six.

Rhododendron Inn is 54 miles from Portland and well up the slopes of Mount Hood. It is no difficult matter to automobile to Cloud Cap Inn on Mount Hood in the summer time. But to make a trip such as was made by the Hudson Six in the month of January is a feat that never before has been accomplished.

Not until the Hudson struck snow about five inches deep was it turned about for the return trip. At Rhododendron Inn the passengers were delighted with the information given by the keepers that the Hudson Six was the first car to reach that point as early in the year as January. No automobile party ever had ascended so high at that season.



### VALUE OF WATER AND FRUIT JUICES.

Water is not a food, but a carrier of food to all parts, and waste from all parts of the body. We are taught, too little drinking of fresh, pure water is the cause of much physical disturbance. Overeating and little drinking of water is said to be our greatest American failing in dietetics.

Water should not be iced, but cool enough to be palatable, either summer or winter, and the amount each individual should take depends largely on the food eaten. If one eats largely of fruit, less water is needed, and if one drinks much milk, less is required, but even the very young baby should be given frequent drinks of cold water.

Orange juice, a teaspoonful at a time, neither before nor immediately after milk, is a most delightful and refreshing drink for even very young children.

As children must suffer with their teeth, when the little gums are inflamed and swollen, a drink of cool water will give much relief.

The acids in fruits play an important office in destroying those germs which create gases and cause auto-intoxication. Fruit juices act on the kidneys and quench thirst. At the same time they are a natural laxative.

A juicy, good flavored apple is better than medicine, and should be eaten many times a day. Scraped apples may be given to young children.

The reason that fruit is best eaten either early or late in the day is that the stomach is empty and thus the digestive juices have free access to the fruit juices, stimulating them to action.

To keep in good condition, drink freely of water before retiring, as this flushes the system. The first thing in the morning rinse the stomach with a good tonic of cold fresh water a half hour at least before eating.

Though fruit contains little nutrition, it has a large amount of cellulose which adds bulk to the food and stimulates the activity of the juices on the digestive tract, thus aiding digestion.

Harmony is Best to Secure Best Results From Farm Laborer—Mean Boss Won't Do.

On our farm, where I worked we had 40 cows to milk morning and night. Two of us to do the work under a boss who was mean, fault-finding and dictatorial, and who always thought we were not accomplishing what we should and also always had us do some work for us to attack before we were properly through with what we were then doing. We watched our every move, routed us out at four o'clock in the morning and saw to it that it was eight or nine o'clock at night before we were through. We were supplied with candles for retiring, which were usually short enough to burn out within half an hour after going to our sleeping quarters. Indisposition on the part of any workman was no excuse, pay being deducted for time spent on the sick list, and never, while I was there, was there any sympathy shown or any attempt made to help a man recover. Such a boss loses more in consequence, through lack of interest and from carelessness in the performance of the work on the part of his help than is compensated by the extra work done for the satisfaction, to him, of having goaded his men as far as lay in his power. The men became listless and shiftless, feeling that no matter how hard or conscientiously they worked the boss was never satisfied. To obtain the best united effort of all the men there must be harmony or the disgruntled ones will soon turn away the man who is a good worker and who tries conscientiously to do his best.—A Hired Man.

Aeroplane attacks on German submarines at Hoboken Zeebrugge, Belgium, have been accomplished successfully, according to the British admiralty. Five German submarines were destroyed, and the remainder being constructed at Hoboken near Antwerp, it was stated; also four were dropped on two submarines at Zeebrugge, and it is believed successfully. Both planes returned safely.

**Grey Off for Vacation.**  
Premier Asquith temporarily has taken charge of the British foreign office. Sir Edward Grey having been compelled to take a short vacation. It is expected Sir Edward will be away from the ministry about three weeks. The premier received the diplomatic callers today.

**War on Alcohol.**  
The war on alcohol, an outcome of the labor situation in Great Britain, has definitely taken precedence over the much talked of "spring advance" of the Allies in the west the reason being that the problem of munitions has become more pressing than that of recruiting.

The pronouncements of cabinet leaders and the letter of King George on the question of temperance are intended to pave the way and sound public sentiment preparatory to either shutting off absolutely the sale of drink throughout the country, except on physicians' prescriptions, or the adoption of some measure, which, while perhaps not called absolute prohibition, will have almost as drastic an effect.

**Kitchener Sets Example.**  
The battlefields in the east and the west afford little news today, and although the Allies are reported as having resumed operations in the Dardanelles, nothing official is forthcoming.

**Papers Speculate.**  
Today being the centenary of the birth of Bismarck, the London newspapers review editorially the career of this German statesman ending in the break with the present emperor and speculate on what might have been the outcome of the war to date had Bismarck been at the helm.

Austria would seem to be strengthening her forces in Bukovina with the idea of thwarting a formidable Russian advance in the Carpathians and this, according to the British view, explains the Austrian incursions into Russia over the Dniester river at a point near Czernowitz.

War Secretary Kitchener has announced that no alcoholic beverages shall be served in his household for the duration of the war.

**TRAIN OF AUTOS PASS THROUGH CITY.**  
An entire train, running under special orders and loaded with Franklin automobiles on their way from Syracuse to Walla Walla, Wash., and other points in the Northwest, passed through here yesterday on the Northern Pacific railroad.

From information given out by the railroad officials this shipment is the second trainload leaving the Franklin factory for this same section within a month, and exceeds the first shipment by seven carloads.

To Walla Walla alone, 20 Franklins are included. With the 20 cars of the same make also shipped to that point a month ago, this city or 19,000 population establishes a record for the sale of high-grade automobiles.

Spokane, Billings, Seattle, Portland and Grafton, also figure largely in this trainload which in all represents a value of over \$100,000. From figures issued by the Syracuse Chamber of Commerce, this shipment exceeds in value any other shipment of merchandise ever leaving that city.

This special trainload of 20 Franklins breaks all records for single shipments of high-grade cars. The former mark was also set by the Franklin only a few weeks ago.

The shipment represents the longest trip ever taken by a trainload of automobiles, for after reaching its destination it will have traversed 2757 miles across the continent.

The outlay for freight alone on this trainload exceeds the \$4,000 mark.

### DAKOTA FARM CLEARED

SENSELESS WAR ON NORTH DAKOTA FARM CLEARED UP BY AUTHORITIES.

Grand Forks, Minn., April 1.—A friendly handshake, which he intended as his parting act, led Frank Shyka into all kinds of trouble at the Jacob Hollweyer farm near Arvilla.

Mrs. Hollweyer, with whom Shyka offered to shake hands as he was leaving the farm, having been discharged by her husband, misinterpreted his intention and began screaming for help. Her husband appeared armed with a revolver.

Shyka, brought to the Grand Forks county jail, cleared himself by his straightforward story to officials, and the charge of insanity, laid against him, was abandoned.

Shyka and his employer had been talking about the European war, and differences in their allegiance, as between Germany and Russia, led to bad blood. Shyka's discharge and his subsequent arrest.
