PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS APRIL 26, 1915. The board of city commissioners met in regular session, Commissioners Batty, Bertsch, Best, Kirk and President Lucas being present. Minutes of meeting held the 20th inst. were read and approved. Messrs. G. M. Register, J. P. Jackson, Carl Bredy and John Pollock ask

ed that a committee be appointed to consider the advisability of changing the street grade on Avenues B and C between Tenth and Eleventh streets and Eleventh street between Avenues B and C. The president appointed Commissioners Best, Bertsch and Batty to be such committee, who were also directed to consider and report upon the petition requesting the installation of an arc light at the intersection of Thayer and Fourteenth streets.

A resolution, introduced by Commissioner Batty was adopted, providing that all city appointees shall file their undated resignations at the same time as they file their bonds and oaths of office. A resolution fixing the amount of bonds of city officers as follows, was adopted: Auditor, \$1,000; treasurer, \$5,000; attorney, \$1,000; magistrate, \$1,000; health commissioner, \$500; milk inspector, \$500; overseer of poor, \$500; chief of police, \$1,000; patrolman, \$500; fire chief, \$500; custodian of city hall, \$500; street commissioner, \$1,000; city engineer, \$5,000.

A resolution was adopted requiring all city employes to furnish surety bonds in the amount of same should be paid by the city. The following city officers were appointed: Auditor, R. H. Thistlethwaite; a resolution providing for combining the duties of auditor and city weigher was introduced by Commissioner Best and action deferred; city attorney, F. E. McCurdy; city weigher, J. D. Wakeman; chief of police, C. R. Downing; captain of police, Chris Anderson; chief of fire department, H. A. Thompson; custodian of fire hall, B. W. Cleveland; street commissioner, F. D. Germain; city treasurer, L. E. Opydke; health commissioner, F. B. Strauss; milk inspector, A. Larson.

A resolution offered by Commissioner Batty was adopted designating the following banks as city depositories in the amounts named: First National Bank, \$25,000. Bismarck Bank, \$20,000. City National Bank, \$20,000. A resolution offered by Commissioner Batty was adopted directing the auditor to advertise for bids for the city printing for the ensuing two years. A letter from the Joseph R. Bean company of New York relating to the adoption of a municipal flag was read. The city engineer's estimate in the sum of \$236.50 for laying of sewer pipe culverts across Broadway, etc., was referred to Commissioner Batty on the question of manner of payment of same.

The matter of the expiration of the bond of the city treasurer on the 21st inst. was referred to Commissioner Batty. The request of John Homan for permission to remodel the building on the corner of Broadway and Fifth street was referred to Commissioner Kirk. A communication signed by W. V. Kiebert and ten others relating to the insurance on the municipal auditorium was referred to Commissioner Batty.

The financial report of the city auditor up to April 18, 1915, was referred to Commissioner Batty. The report of the Taxpayers' Committee was referred to Commissioner Best. A resolution creating Sewer Improvement District No. 4 was read, but further action deferred pending the position of 51 per cent of the property owners liable to be assessed upon special assessment, and the matter was referred to Commissioner Bertsch. On motion the board adjourned. R. H. THISTLETHWAITE, City Auditor.

Tabloid Aeroplanes. The British reason, quite logically, that the smaller the aeroplane and the faster it can fly the less danger of its being hit by shots fired from earth.
