N. Y. HERALD WISHES TEDDY WAS PRESIDENT

New York, May 10.—The Herald this morning appears with turned rules on each of its twenty-four pages. On each page of the main section in black border are the words, "In Memoriam: American Men, Women, and Children Lost on Board The Lusitania." On the editorial page are several short paragraphs reading, "What a pity Theodore Roosevelt is not president of the United States today." Other paragraphs on the same page read: "What is President Wilson going to do about it?" On the editorial page, also under the caption: "In Memoriam to the American Women and Children Drowned on Board the Lusitania," is an article stating that "the country has counted its dead and calculated its loss," and concluded, "and now the reckoning." The editorial is set in italic and headed.

ANTI-GERMAN RIOTS AT VICTORIA, B. C., CAUSES \$35,000 LOSS

PUBLIC FUNERAL STOPS WHILE RELATIVES TRY TO IDENTIFY DEAD

Queenstown, May 10.—The great public funeral held here for the victims of the Lusitania was delayed today by the arrival of hundreds of friends and relatives arriving from

various parts of the British Isles, who had past the coffins of 54 unidentified dead. Seeking a last opportunity to find those for whom they were searching. The procession was delayed for the entire forenoon, it being devoted to last efforts at identification. All the churches in Queenstown, Protestant and Catholic, held memorial services this morning.

LEO. M. FRANK HANGS JUNE 22

His Wife Bows Head on Arms and Sobs as Sentence Is Pronounced.

Atlanta, May 10.—Leo M. Frank today was sentenced to be hanged Tuesday, June 22, for the murder of Mary Phagan. He was brought before Judge Hill. Frank, reiterated his innocence of the murder, declaring he suffers another's crime. He said at some future date the whole world would realize the truth of his innocence and plea.

When Frank finished his statement the judge ordered the original sentence of death to be executed and set the date. As the judge concluded, Mrs. Frank bowed her head on her arms, and sobbed. His Statement. Leo M. Frank, when brought before Judge Hill to be sentenced, made this statement: "I stand before you. Again I can not reiterate that I am innocent of the murder of Mary Phagan. I have no guilty knowledge of that occurrence. I am innocent of this charge and I assert the record of the evidence conclusively proves this. No appellate court has ever passed upon this case. I am the only judge who has ever heard it stated that he

Will Not Avenge Death. "My execution will not avenge Mary Phagan's death. A life will have been taken for a life, but the real culprit will not have paid the penalty. I will suffer for another's crime. "My trust is in God, who knows that my protestations of innocence are the truth. At some future date, the whole mortal world will realize it. It is the knowledge that God knows it now and the world will know it some day, that inspires me as I stand before your honor and as I face the future.

Position Precarious. "Anything else I might say at this time would be but an elaboration of my words to the court. Yet I am fully alive to the fact that my position is most precarious. It is a situation which is far removed from anything that my life and mental attitude have bespoken. It is hideous, but at the same time so unreal so incongruous. "It is fundamental in human life to want to live. This desire to exist is ingrained in all of us—it is the basic morality of all who live. To those who have the proper ideals of living, life without honor is insufferable. This is the message of theology and ethics. "In the light of the whole truth known—and the Almighty knows—that the morality of my position in this case is unassailable. This being so, my complete exoneration of this terrible charge lies in the future. When that day arrives I shall be vindicated—and if I am alive I will be enabled to enjoy freedom and honor. "Therefore, I want to live. "The full truth and all of the facts in the case, when they come to light, as some day they will, will prove to the world that no assertion of innocence is the truth. "The legal arena is closed to me.


