

PROGRAM FOR OFFICERS' CAMP

School of Instruction for North Dakota National Guard Officials.

The program for the officers' camp of instruction, North Dakota National Guard, to be held at Devils Lake, from May 17 to 21, inclusive, has just been issued, and the order for the school of instruction will issue from the office of the adjutant general within a few days.

The program for the school is as follows:

- Monday, May 17
7:30 a. m.—All officers: Conference object of the school; talk on and explanation of the program; references for students to look up between classes; talk on administration by the Adjutant General.
9:30 a. m.—Class A—Practical studies in map reading, visibility problems; tactical use of ground (War Game Map and 4 in. Map of Leavenworth).
Class B—Instruction in use of cleaning material; how and when to clean the rifle; how to give preliminary instruction in target practice.
1:30 p. m.—Class A: War Game.
Class B: First Aid; sanitation on the march, etc.
3:30 p. m.—All Officers: Practical demonstration of leading a column.
4:30 p. m.—All officers: Drill in Manual of the Saber and giving commands.
Tuesday, May 18
7:30 a. m.—All officers: Problem in field firing with ball cartridges (to demonstrate the necessity of correct range finding, fire direction, distribution and control, etc.)
1:30 p. m.—Class A: War Game.
Class B: Tactical walk; conduct of patrols and reconnaissance parties (assumed situation).
3:30—All officers: Demonstration of methods of instruction by use of sand table; construction of ground forms of a given area as represented by map; topography, map reading, contouring, reconnaissance, etc.
Wednesday, May 19
7:30 a. m.—All officers: Tactical walk; selection of location and laying out of trenches.

1:30 p. m.—Class A: War Game.
Class B: Tactical walk; problems in advance guard with assumed situations.
3:30—All officers: Practical exercises in position sketching; use of field message book.
Thursday, May 20
7:30 a. m.—All officers: Attack problem; company acting alone; officers formed in provisional company for the purpose; enemy outlined.
1:30 p. m.—Class A: War Game.
Class B: Talk on and practical demonstration of methods of recruit instruction. Necessity for uniform system of instruction throughout the state.
3:30—All officers: Tactical walk; the battalion acting alone in attack.
Friday, May 21
7:30 a. m.—All officers: Tactical walk; the regiment in attack; exercises in writing field orders and messages to employ every unit of the regiment; methods to use in getting organizations in position for attack; assumed situation.
1:30 p. m.—Pay; break camp.
Note: Class A will consist of all field and staff officers; Class B will consist of all company officers.

CIRCUS MUST HAVE A PERMIT

Before Its Animals May Be Transported Into This State This Summer.

Even circuses must be careful about transporting diseased animals from one state into another in these times of hoof and mouth and other diseases in the United States. The Gollmar Brothers desire to bring their circus to North Dakota late in June or early in July and the following letter to Dr. Crewe, state veterinarian, and Dr. Crewe's permit are self explanatory:
From Circus People:
"Baraboo, Wis., May 2, 1915: Dr. W. F. Crewe, state veterinarian, Bismarck, North Dakota. Dear sir: I would be very grateful to you for an official letter permitting our entrance into North Dakota. It is our desire to enter North Dakota late in June or early in July and we are carrying no split-footed, cud-chewing animals or other ruminants; are spraying our cars with a five percent solution of cresole and traveling strictly in accordance with federal rulings. An immediate letter of permit and other suggestions would be greatly appreciated. Yours truly, Gollmar Brothers."
