WISCONSIN WINS THE TRACK MEET

Noses Chicago University by Only One Point; Records Broken.

Urbana, Ill., June 5.—The University of Wisconsin won the fifteenth annual track field meet of the intercollegiate conference athletic association on the Illinois field today, having a margin of but one point over the team of the University of Chicago. The final count was Wisconsin 38; Chicago 37; University of Missouri third with 21; University of Illinois, last year's champion, fourth with 15. Eight conference records were broken or tied in fifteen events. Chief among the stellar performers were Robert Simpson, Missouri, hurdler; Francis Ward, whom Coach Staggs of Chicago changed into a sprinter from a hurdler this spring. Simpson tied the world's record of fifteen seconds flat for the 120 yards high hurdles and lowered the conference record in the 220 yards hurdles to 0:24 3-5. Ward equalled the national intercollegiate record of 0:24 4-5 for the century dash, tying the conference mark of 0:21 3-5 in the furlong.
