ARE SENTENCED**

**Christopher Case Is Continued
Over the Present Term of
Court.**

Lambert, the man who was recently convicted of grand larceny, the specific crime being the theft of a horse the property of a local livery barn, was yesterday given an indeterminate sentence of from one to five years in the penitentiary. William Thompson, charged with unlawfully entering the Indian school, was sentenced to serve a term of ten days in the county jail. Ross Baker, convicted of the crime of robbery when tried for entering a warehouse at Moditt, was given a suspended sentence by Judge Nuesse.

Lambert, who will have to spend the next year or more at the penitentiary, is wanted by Montana officers for passing worthless checks. His Montana name is said to be C. Miller. The case against Jack Christopher, a local taxi driver, bound over on a robbery charge, and the case against Frank Montgomery, charged with bastardy, each was carried over to the next term of district court.

**MISS HANSON FINED
FOR EMBEZZLEMENT**

Minot, N. D., June 12.—Miss Ethel Hanson, accompanied by a few friends, was in Minot last night, on her way home to Lansford from Fargo, where yesterday she entered a plea of guilty in the United States district court to embezzlement of the funds of the Lansford postoffice,

where she was postmaster. She was fined \$772, which is the amount of money she was charged with embezzling.

The court in passing sentence, took into consideration the fact that the money embezzled had been paid back to the government, some of it by Miss Hanson herself and the other by her bondsmen.

It seems from the statements of the case in court that Miss Hanson had simply used the funds of the post-office for personal purposes and had intended to replace the amount, but the postoffice inspector dropped in and made the investigation before she could restore what she had used.

She has been removed from the office and the amount of the fine imposed will be paid, so that she will not be required to serve any time in jail.

Miss Hanson, who is 24 years old, is prepossessing in appearance and is above the average in intelligence, and it is claimed by her friends that she merely made a mistake in using the government funds without having any real criminal intent to defraud.

In a letter received in Minot today the news was contained that Charles Pala, who left here a few days ago, to take the examination for entry into the United States Naval academy at Annapolis, was not accepted, owing to a slight defect in one ear. Charles, however, was one of the 204 out of 520 who passed the mental examination. An ear specialist who was consulted says that the defect can be remedied in a few months and that Charles may take the required examination this fall.

A FOOT THEY GO**

**Three Berlin Newspapermen Have
Big Contract to Ful-
fill.**

William Eerner and Lawrence A. Henning, who are reporters on the staff of the Berlin (Germany) Daily News, and who are on a trip around the world, on foot, have been in the city for a few days on their way west. They stopped long enough to get letters from Mayor Lucas and from the governor's office stating that they had been in this city.

These two young men say that they left Berlin on May 1, 1914, to win a prize of 50,000 marks (\$12,500) by carrying out the provisions of the contest, namely, that they travel 25,000 miles, through four continents, in a period of five years, afoot. They walked from Berlin to Hamburg and then took second class pas-

sage on the steamship America for this country. They peeled potatoes and worked at odd jobs for two days and the first class passengers took up a collection and thus they received enough to pay their passage and had a capital of \$13 when they reached New York. They make their expenses by selling post cards and lecturing.

From New York they walked to Philadelphia and then the news of the great European struggle reached them. They attempted to return to Germany, they say, but were unable to secure passage. They wired to their paper for instructions, were told to make a special trip through the United States and they expect later to go to Hawaii, the Philippines, Japan and thence to Germany. They are going to the Yellowstone National Park and the two big expositions on the coast now.

Wille von Hausen, the third member of the party, is working his way westward, via Omaha, Neb., and other points south of here.
