### STUDIO FAVORITE REACHES AGE LIMIT

The biggest celebrity in Bismarck's animal kingdom, died this week, when "Robin," the angora cat owned by Mrs. W. E. Butler died. Robin was over twelve years of age, a rip old age in catdom, and was known to hundreds of people in Bismarck. For the past several years the cat has been a pet at the Butler studio. Several years ago Robin was given credit for saving the lives of both Mr. and Mrs. Butler, by waking them in time to prevent asphyxiation, from escaping coal gas.

Potato Soup. Boil two cupfuls diced potatoes, half cupful chopped celery and parsley, with a little onion in salted water, until tender. Thicken with a tablespoonful each of butter and flour and rub to a paste. All two cups of hot new milk, season with a little white pepper; bring all to a boil, stirring until smooth, and serve.

Frozen Macaroon Pudding. One pint whipped cream, one-quarter pound stale macaroons, rolled; one-quarter pound candied fruit, chopped; sugar to taste. Flavor to taste with vanilla or maraschino. Freeze three hours.

### LITIGATION MAY UNDO PETITIONS

Authorities on Question Say Petitions Will Not Stand the Test.

Considerable interest has been created throughout the state in regard to the petitions recently filed with the secretary of state, in an attempt to suspend several bills passed at the recent session of the legislature.

Only three of the sixteen petitions sent in had a sufficient number of names attached to them to hold up the bills and make them temporarily inoperative. The bills in question are the Terminal Elevator bill, The Bootleggers bill and the Immigration bill. It is likely that actions will be started in the very near future to have the petitions set aside. The contention of the interested parties that none of the petitions will stand the test of litigation. There has been considerable question as to the framers of the petitions, and also in regard to a number of the signatures attached to them.

Several attorneys have been interviewed on the question and the unanimous opinion is that enough names could be scratched off any of the petitions for some irregularity to make them invalid. The petition in regard to the Elevator bill was not properly drawn up, and could most likely be thrown out for that reason. The only petition which seems at all likely to stand up in the opinions of attorneys is the bootleggers bill, which seems to be properly drawn up, and to contain more apparently legitimate signatures than any of the other petitions.

No definite action has been taken as yet in regard to the matter, but it is almost assured that an action will be started in a short time.

### HORSE INSPECTION AT CUSTER RANCH

A horse inspection for the French government will take place at Custer Trail ranch, five miles south of Medora, Friday and Saturday, July 16 and 17, and at Dickinson July 18. The French government proposes to buy all the mares and geldings they can secure. They require horses from five to ten years of age, sound and of good color, about 15 to 16 and one half hands high. The work horse type is much preferred. Prices will range about as follows: Cavalry, \$115; Gunners \$140 and Artillery \$155. All horses sold at the above sale will be sold under a contract with the French government.



Accompanied by Premier Asquith, Colonel's Hankey and Fitzgerald, he arrived Tuesday. They are guests of Commander French. They visited the flying corps and the cadet school in the afternoon.
