STRAWBERRY LAKE. This lake is connected with Long Lake and both are surrounded with trees. They are gravel bottom and in both is a good supply of perch. The farmers for many miles around Strawberry Lake come here for picnics, celebrations and vacations. The Farmers' Equity Association hold annual meetings on the banks of this lake and have speakers to address them on the various branches of farming.

PAINTED WOODS LAKE. About 35 miles north of Bismarok, N. D., and eight miles west of Wilton, in Burleigh county is Painted Woods Lake. This lake is beautifully situated, is surrounded with a good growth of timber has fine beach for bathing and has an outlet that runs into the Missouri River.

FISH LAKE, ST. JOHN, N. D. Located in the Turtle Mountains, seven miles from St. John, N. D., is Fish Lake. The North Dakota state Fish Hatchery is located here, and from this hatchery Black Bass, Brook Trout, Yellow Perch, Rainbow Trout, Bream Trout and Pike Perch are sent to lakes and streams all over the state. The Hatchery and Fish Lake, being only seven miles from St. John on the Great Northern Railway, a great many people from all points in the state and from many other states come in by train to summer or to camp for a few days. Farmers from near and far come to Fish Lake by wagon, automobile and train. Picnic parties are held at Fish Lake every day during the summer months.

Mandan Country Club. Charles Kidd has been awarded the contract for the construction of the club house for the Mandan Town and Country club. The first steps in the project have already been taken. The board of directors and the members of various committees have visited the land, acquired from the government last winter, and with the aid of County Surveyor T. L. Lough, staked out the site of the building, and the tennis courts. Work will be started immediately on the construction of the building, which will be one story with high roof in bungalow style. The architect, Mr. Jackson, who was in Mandan last winter doing special work for the government at the experimental station, drew the plans which have been adopted, and are considered to be the most original in arrangement possible for a club house of this class. A large ball room 30 by 40 feet in size takes up the whole west side. At the east a reception hall 25 by 16 may be shut off from the dance floor and by opening large sliding doors, can be used to enlarge the dancing floor. W. F. BERRIER PASSES AT ROCHESTER, MINN.

William F. Berrier of Flasher died Thursday night at the Mayo Brothers' hospital at Rochester following an operation. Mr. Berrier was 52 years old, and a pioneer merchant at Flasher, where the Berrier Mercantile Company is one of the largest establishments of its kind west of the river in this state. When Mr. Berrier first went to Flasher he was associated with the William H. Brown Land Company. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Berrier, and two children, one daughter, Mrs. George H. Spielman, and young son, Harold. He was alone when the end came, his family being as far as Mandan on their way to his

bedside, when the message came saying that he was dead. The funeral will be held in Minneapolis, the old home of the family, the last of this week, and interment will also take place in that city.

Mr. Berrier leaves a wide circle of friends and business associates who will mourn his untimely death and who extend to his family their sincere condolence in their hour of grief. He helped to build up the city of Flasher and was for so many years identified with its business and social interests that his loss will be keenly felt.

Watford, N. D., Aug. 20.—Eighty McKenzie county girls and boys, belonging to the newly organized agricultural and home clubs, held a get-together meeting at Arnegard yesterday, some of them coming 60 miles by auto. Many parents and others interested in the club work were present.

The meeting was the outcome of the efforts of County Superintendent F. J. Steffek, who, with the aid of Miss Julia Newton, state club agent for boys' and girls' agricultural and home clubs, has organized more than 200 boys and girls in the county into corn and vegetable growing and sewing and cooking clubs.

Miss Newton presided at the meeting and gave a demonstration of the cold pack method of canning vegetables. The peas and carrots used for demonstration purposes had been raised by the girls.

The girls served a picnic dinner which had been prepared wholly by themselves. In the afternoon members of four of the boys' clubs matched strength in two ball games.
