METHODISTS TO MEET AT FARGO

Program for Annual Conference of Church Is Made Public

Plans have been completed for the annual conference of the Methodist church, which will be held at Fargo, October 13 to October 15, inclusive. The reports to the conference in 1914 show the following: Membership, 10,743; value of churches, \$786,995; number of churches, 195. Number of parsonages, 123; value of parsonages, \$231,800.

There are 255 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 22,811. The churches gave for benevolences, including missions, etc., the sum of \$28,645, and paid for the support of the ministers, \$161,569.

The conference had 143 full members and 28 probationers; the latter being young men serving what might be called an apprenticeship in the ministry; they are approved as candidates for final ordination. The program for the conference is as follows:

HUNTING SEASON STARTS TODAY

Hundreds of Hunters Take to Fields in Quest of Prairie Chickens

MANY NON RESIDENT'S LICENSE ARE ISSUED

The hunting season in North Dakota for game birds and aquatic fowl opened today, with hundreds of hunters in the field ready to seize the first opportunity to bag a few birds. Hunters have been making preparations for the past several weeks and a number plan on camping out for several weeks, while the hunt is on. All trains for the past several days have been carrying hunters to all parts of the state. Others have gone out in machines, and any number with rigs. One look in the baggage car of any of the trains through the city is enough to convince one that the season is at hand. Bags of all kinds are being shipped to the hunting grounds.

Chickens and ducks are said to be plentiful in all parts of the state. The past season has been exceptionally favorable for ducks, and they are reported from every lake, stream and water hole in the state. Chickens also have had an exceptionally good season, especially in the western and central sections of the state. The heavy rains in the eastern part killed on a great many, however. All forms of spring shooting are prohibited. The bag limit for grouse and chickens is 10 per day and for ducks and geese, 15 per day.

The following are protected: Deer, antelope, beaver, Otter, partridge, pheasants, quail, doves swans

The open seasons are as follows: Prairie chicken, grouse, snipe and plover, from September 7 to November 1; wild ducks, geese and brant, September 7 to November 1; trout and any variety of landlocked salmon, from May 1 to October 1; black, gray or Caswego bass, from June 1 to October 15; pike, croppies or perch, from May 1 to October 15; mink or muskrat, from November 15 to April 15.

New Game Laws. The state game and fish laws were entirely changed by the last legislative assembly and sportsmen throughout the state are amazed by the game wardens to become familiar with the new laws at once. The laws became effective July 1.

Practically every law in the state relating to game and fish was repealed at the last session.

The following summary of changes in the laws was compiled by the state game and fish commissioner:

- Changes in the game laws that go into effect July 1: (1) Taxidermist, dog trainers and trappers require a license. The former two are obtained from the secretary at Fargo, the latter from the county auditor. (2) Any person convicted of a violation of the game laws forfeits his license, and is barred from hunting the balance of the season. (3) Duplicate of lost license cannot be issued. New ones must be taken out. (4) Bird dogs must not run loose in the fields. (5) Dog training season opens Aug. 1. Guns must not be carried when training dogs. (6) Bag limit on ducks and geese reduced to 15 per day. Chickens remain unchanged. (7) Rescuing wardens, penalty provided. (8) Game preserves to be established. (9) Impersonating game wardens prohibited. Penalty, this will be rigidly enforced. Much deception has been practiced by this in the past. Unless parties representing themselves as wardens can produce proper credentials, showing their authority, they will be prosecuted as impostors. (10) Alien Gun Law. Under this law, any alien (or any unaturalized citizen) who has not either taken out his intention papers, or lived 3 years

In the state is prohibited from hunting or even owning a gun or rifle in this state. The possession of such guns is prima facie evidence of guilt. 
