EDWARD F. TREFZ TO MEET BUSINESS MEN

Field Secretary of Chamber of Commerce to Be Here
Next Tuesday
WILL BE ENTERTAINED BY COMMERCIAL CLUB
Address Will Be Given on Problems Confronting the Businessman

Mr. Edward F. Trefz, field secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, will spend Tuesday, October 5, in this city, the guest of the Commercial club. He will be entertained at a membership luncheon at noon. Every member of the club and every business man in the city who is not a member of the club is urged to attend the meeting. The address will be upon "Problems Confronting the Business Men in the Near Future." The Commercial club of this city is a member of the National chamber.

Mr. Trefz has seen the Chamber of Commerce of the United States grow until now it represents 300,000 firms, corporations and business men representing the leading trade bodies in every state in the Union, Hawaii, Porto Rico, and the Philippines, not to mention the American Chambers of Commerce in Berlin, Paris, Milan and Constantinople. In fact, conceived at the White House but three short years ago, the National Chamber has grown by leaps and bounds until now it is the largest organization of its kind in the world.
Many Reforms.
In these years the National Chamber, obedient to its referendum, has suggested several vital amendments to the Federal Reserve Act; has suggested and obtained the adoption of the Federal Advisory Council to assist in the Federal Reserve Board; at the instance of Secretary Redfield has assisted in the readjustment of the Department of Commerce, including the collation and appointment of an increased number of commercial attaches, made acquainted by it with the business needs of the country before being sent abroad. The Chamber has influenced exceedingly important modifications that appear in the final form of the trust bills. It is already on record by an overwhelming vote in favor of a permanent non-partisan tariff commission. It has declared for the National Budget system and has shown the sentiment of the business men of the country on the merchant marine situation. In the fall a referendum will be taken on the much-discussed Seaman's Act.
On Foreign Trade.
A special committee of the chamber is working at present in co-operation with the Federal Trade Commission on a number of important matters including the question of combination for foreign trade exploitation. Recognizing the obsolete character of most of the commercial treaties of the United States and the need of co-operation of business men in the making of treaties, the chamber has appointed a special committee which is already at work on the prospective Russian and Spanish treaties.
Plans are also being made for a national system of labor exchanges to deal with the question of employment; and at the suggestion of the secretary of labor asking the chamber's co-operation, a committee has now been appointed for this purpose.
Under the chairmanship of Hon. T. Herrick, a committee is being formed to consider the establishment of a rural credit system, which question

TO HOLD HEARING ON ELEVATOR QUESTION

Railroad Commission to Settle Question of Storage Charges on Grain
For several years there has been more or less friction between the different grain buyers of the state over the matter of charging storage on stored grain, from which charges of discrimination have frequently been sent in to the board of railroad commissioners.
The law does not say that storage shall be charged, except by inference through the establishment of a maximum charge of not to exceed two cents a bushel, and the commission has never made a ruling as to whether or not this charge was obligatory, although it has held that grain buyers may not charge one customer storage and not another. In other words the buyer must either charge all his customers storage or charge none.
At the request of the Grain Bulletin, a Minneapolis periodical devoted to the grain business, the commission has decided to hold a hearing somewhere in the state, at a time and place to be decided later, when this question of grain storage charges will be gone into fully and a rule made by the commission which will bring all the elevators of the state uniformly in line.
This is a very interesting question and means considerable to the farmer as well as the grain dealer, and it is so important, as a factor relating to discrimination, that it is hoped the hearing will be well attended by all parties interested.
