HAZELTON

The Livest Town on the Linton Branch of the Northern Pacific Railway; Its Merchants Are Up and Doing All the Time.

Hazelton is situated on the Linton branch of the Northern Pacific Railway some fifty-two miles southeast of Bismarck in about the center of Emmons county and is the second largest in Emmons county.

The topography of the surrounding country is gently rolling. The soil is of deep black loam and is well adapted to diversified farming. The farms have been greatly improved around the vicinity of Hazelton within the past five years and increasing in value every year. Hazelton has five large elevators with a capacity of much over two hundred thousand bushels, but this is only a small amount of the wheat that is shipped out of Hazelton each year. There are also several train loads of livestock, including cattle, horses and sheep that are sold each season, bringing in thousands of dollars.

Hazelton has three large department stores, two drug stores, two hotels, a meat market, two lumber yards, three garages, four churches, two banks, both in new buildings where they can give the best of service to their customers; a lively barn, good schools, a movie, water and light systems. A harness shop and three auto concerns, which have supplied nearly every farmer within several miles of Hazelton with a car to carry on their business and in general, the people of this vicinity

are very prosperous. Hazelton, also has four cream stations that ship out daily many gallons of cream to Bismarck and the Twin Cities.
