The officials of the Soo Line have announced that a special train will be run from Max to Bismarck, stopping at all intermediate points, Monday, October 11. The train will return the same night, leaving this city at 9 p. m.

Leave Max 7:30 a. m.; Garrison, 8:00 a. m.; Cole Harbor, 8:30 a. m.; Underwood, 8:50 a. m.; Wascamburn, 9:30 a. m.; Wilton, 10:30 a. m.; Baldwin, 10:20 a. m. Arrive Bismarck 11:10 a. m. Returning, the train will leave here at 9 p. m.

HISTORIC TABLET UNEARTHED RECENTLY.

Was Used as Door-Step by Finders for Many Years.

Minneapolis, Oct. 5.—Historians are devoting considerable attention to a stone tablet, five feet long and two and a half feet wide, unearthed at the home of Luther Gates, 53 1/2 Fort-eighth avenue, South, and bearing what appears to be the royal coat of arms of Spain.

There is no date or lettering on the tablet that might reveal its story. Some historians, when the slab was first examined, expressed the belief that the relic might have been identified with the feats of some early explorer.

The design of a crown is carved at the top of the stone, which weighs

300 pounds. In one corner appears an old castle, and to the right is the figure of a lion. This carving is circled by chains and at the base of the design has been carved the figure of a dead lamb, suspended with thorns.

Investigation disclosed that the stone first was found buried near Fort Snelling, some ten years ago, but not knowing its value as a relic, Linton W. Haversack, a pioneer citizen, used it as a doorstep for several years. "When my house was removed," he said, "the slab fell into the cellar and remained there until a new house was built on the site and Gates began digging a well. My brother-in-law found the stone buried near Fort Snelling and three of us carried it home. We turned the smooth side up and tramped daily over the royal coat of arms for years."

"There can be no doubt that the tablet is genuine and of great antiquity," said Warren Upham, archaeological secretary of the Minnesota Historical society. "We are unable to find a solution as to how the tablet found its resting place near Fort Snelling, but shall continue to investigate. The limestone of which the tablet is made is different from any substance before found in these parts."

"It is not impossible that investigation will prove that the stone once marked the northern boundary of Spanish territory," said Sclon J. Bach, secretary of the Minnesota Historical society. The relic undoubtedly is of historical value."

Await Bulgaria's Move.
The next move devolves upon Bulgaria and as soon as she moves, the Anglo-French troops which are being mobilized will be put in motion, while the fleet in the Black Sea and the Aegean will assume their appointed roles.

Meanwhile Russia whose armies for five months have been offering her an energetic offensive along a wide front from Riga to southeast of Viena and according to unofficial reports has already met with considerable success.

This is denied by Berlin, which says that all the Russian attacks have been repulsed.

have again undertaken the task of attempting to level the German entrenchment, presumably in preparation for a continuation of the attack, which proved successful in Artois and Champagne.

The Crown Council of Bulgaria according to a Genoa dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, spent several hours discussing the Russian ultimatum without arriving at a decision. The same authority declared that General Savoff, former Minister of War, and former commander in chief of the Bulgarian army in concluding a thrilling speech said: "Every Bulgarian who breaks away from Russia commits an act of treason towards his country."

Two Boats Sunk.
London, Oct. 5.—Announcement is made that the British steamer Haydn (3293 tons) and sailor Printe (3144 tons) have been sunk. It is reported that the crew of the Haydn was saved and some survivors of the Sailor Printe have been landed.

VENIZELLOS RESIGNS.
Paris, Oct. 5.—An Athens dispatch to the Havas agency says: "Premier Venizelos has resigned, the King having informed him that he was unable to support the policy of his ministry."

LAND FRENCH TROOPS.
Athens, Sunday, Oct. 3, (delayed in transmission).—The French troops landing from five transports at Saloniki, Greece, consist of 70,000 men. They will proceed along the Gueveheli-Uskup railroad to guard the lines.

BULGARIA COMMITTED.
A dispatch from Sofia dated October 4, says: "Premier Painslaboff of Bulgaria today made the following declaration to representatives of the government party: "We confront war and must defend our national interests. We must wrest from our enemies everything they took from us two years ago and get satisfaction for every insult."

GREEKS MOBILIZE.
Greece is able to put 108,000 men fully equipped in the field. Although the mobilization, which includes men up to 43 years of age probably will call for 300,000 troops those over the 180,000 cannot be armed. It is said the government has sufficient funds to continue on a war footing for one month. The problem, therefore, facing the Premier is the obtaining of money from the Triple Entente powers.

The mobilization will be completed Sunday night. The signing of the mobilization order created general relief in Greece.

Germans in Sofia.
Crown Prince George and Prince Nicholas, the members of the Greek staff, are hurriedly arranging to leave for Saloniki.
Telegrams from diplomatic sources report the arrival in Sofia of a large

number of aviators and German officers.

Winter Approaching.
In view of the near approach of the winter season and the effects its coming will have on the military campaigns, interest has been aroused by the prediction of Augustine Rey, the naturalist and meteorologist that the winter will be an exceptionally severe one.

Mr. Rey has communicated to the French government the reasons on which he bases the opinion.

New Recruiting Officer.
The Earl of Derby, at the request of Lord Kitchener, has undertaken the direction of recruiting for the army. The Earl served in South Africa as chief press censor and later as

private secretary of Field Marshal Lord Roberts during the Boer war.

British Seaboard.

The British steamer Arabia enroute from London to Piraeus, Greece, has been torpedoed by an Austrian submarine, twelve miles south of Cyprus. Thirty-five members of the crew were saved.
