

MANY DAKOTANS AT EXPOSITION

Panama-Pacific Exposition Still Continues As Big Attraction

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—During the past ten days several very fine exhibits of vegetables, grains and fruit have arrived at the North Dakota building at the San Francisco exposition. The first to arrive was a big box of vegetables that had been shown at the Williams county fair at Williston. Monday a big trunkful of excellent vegetables from Mott, North Dakota, arrived. This latter shipment was selected and packed by that king of boosters, J. T. Charmley of the Mott Spotlight, and his exhibit adds greatly to the show rooms in the building.

John A. Risk of LaMoure, has placed the building force under great obligations by sending out two exhibits of fine apples grown by Mrs. Hendrikson of Fort Ransom and Mr. and Mrs. Vossburg of Lisbon. So many people think that North Dakota cannot raise apples, so that these two exhibits are especially valuable.

Word has been received at the North Dakota building that other exhibits will be sent in the next few days from other towns and cities in the state. There should be many more on the way, and the commercial clubs of North Dakota should wake up to their great opportunities by having products sent to the North Dakota building at once.

State Insurance Commissioner Walter Taylor of Bismarck, has been going to the Exposition the fore part of this week. He came to the coast to attend the annual convention of the Insurance Commissioners of the United States, and was elected second vice-president of the association, thus scoring one for North Dakota.

Don V. Moore, secretary of the State Fair Association of Grand Forks, gave the Exposition the once-over this week. As an exposition visitor Mr. Moore gets over more ground in a day than any of them, and he will go back to North Dakota with a mighty good idea of the show. Of course he saw many things that will help him in making the Grand Forks fair bigger and better next year.

"Zone of Plenty" Day will be celebrated at the Exposition one day the first week in November, by the six states designated by the Great Northern Railway as the Zone of Plenty—Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon. The arrangements are now in the making and it is safe to say that North Dakota will do its full share to show that it is not the least of the six states.
