## PRESBYTERY MEETS OCTOBER 11-13

Semi-Annual Meeting Will Be Held in Presbyterian Church.

### Public Invited

The semi-annual meeting of the Presbytery of Bismarck will be held in the Presbyterian church, Bismarck, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. The sessions will commence Monday evening at 8 o'clock. The opening sermon will be preached by the Moderator, Rev. Chas. Mutschnick, of Bedford. Mr. Mutschnick is a man whose thorough scholarship, wide experience of the world, and deep piety have fitted him for his recognized position as one of the best preachers of the Presbytery.

The Organization of Presbytery will complete the first evening program. The business proper will begin on Tuesday morning and will be continued throughout that day, and Wednesday.

The Presbytery embraces 25 organized churches, with a number of mission stations, and extends from the eastern boundary of Kidder county to Montana and from South Dakota north to the 12 Principal Meridian or about 3 miles north of Garrison. There are at present 18 ordained ministers members of the Presbytery, 12 of whom are actively employed in the ministry in this Presbytery. Each church also is entitled to send an elder who has equal standing with its professional brethren in the Presbyterian system of church government. Besides these, there are 6 young men, candidates for the ministry, in charge of congregations, 2 of whom will probably be ordained at this meeting.

The Presbytery is the heart of the Presbyterian church polity. It has power to examine and license candidates for the holy ministry, to ordain, install, remove, and pledge ministers, to resolve questions of doctrine or discipline seriously and reasonably proposed, to condemn erroneous opinions which injure the purity and peace of the church, to visit particular churches for the purpose of inquiring into their state, and redressing the evils that may have arisen in them, to unite or divide congregations, at the request of the people, or to form or receive new congregations, and in general to order whatever pertains to the spiritual welfare of the churches under their care.

Several questions of vital importance to the growth of the church will be up for decision and a large attendance is looked for. The public will be cordially welcomed to all the sessions of Presbytery.
