### TELLS STORY OF STATE CONSTITUTION.

When the North Dakota Constitutional convention was in session it was stated in the newspapers of the period that the draft of the constitution was the work of Hon. William M. Everts of New York. Colonel Lounsbury, in his researches for North Dakota History, has developed all of the facts connected with the drawing of the constitution, even to the names of the clerks who compiled the data and the distinguished authority on constitutional law who drew it. Four provisions of the original draft were omitted by the convention. Two of these have since been restored. The whole story is told in Lounsbury's History of North Dakota.

The part published in 1913, as Early History of North Dakota, was only intended as advanced pages. The seven chapters then published have since been enlarged, extended and improved by a wealth of long buried facts which have been developed by two years' further research, adding much to the value and charm of the work. The completed work, bringing the history down to 1915, in four parts, is now ready for the printers.

## ENTERTAINMENTS ARE COMING

Splendid Course Will be Offered Here by Dakota Conservatory of Music

The entertainment goes and especially the music lovers, will look forward with anticipation to the numbers that are to be given here during the winter by the extension department of the Dakota Conservatory of Music at Fargo.

This course provides a variety of attractions by artists of splendid reputation, and the fact that every person appearing in the course is a resident of North Dakota is another feature which will help to popularize it among our people. The state has a talent which it should be proud and which the first time we have had a course made up from the people of our own state.

The first number will appear October 23, a piano and dramatic recital by two young women who were born and reared in North Dakota. Miss Bertha Marie Hogen is a pianist of unusual natural ability coupled with careful and thorough training, with a manner so simple and sympathetic that the heavy classics seem but melodies, which everyone can enjoy. Miss Ella Kivle is a dramatic reader, who always pleases her audience. She has a natural grace and poise, which makes her especially charming, and she is winning encomiums of the highest order.

The interpretative recital to be given by Prof. Ernest A. Boehmer, on Tuesday, November 30, will be one of the finest musical evenings ever given in the city. The opera chosen for his subject will be "Kromig Kind" an especially brilliant and fairy-like production and giving an opportunity of displaying great skill in its interpretation.

Prof. Boehmer is a master pianist and will be able to carry his audience from the light and fairy-like scenes to the more serious and sadder ones with perfect ease. He needs no introduction to Bismarck people for his interpretation of "Parsifal" a few years ago won him a place in the hearts of the people.

February 12, the Wagner Trio will furnish an evening of music largely with string and wind instruments. Harold M. Rudd, a violin soloist of splendid ability, as well as a band and orchestra leader, will charm his hearers. Mr. Melvin P. Rudd's work with the cornet and cello has delighted many audiences in the larger cities of the country, while P. Axel Rudd has a reputation as a baritone soloist which places him high among the singers of the northwest. Aside from their solo work these artists form a string trio and wind instrument trio of the highest merit.

The last number of the course will take place April 22, when Miss Adda M. Blakelee, a soprano soloist and sketch artist, will make her initial visit to many of the North Dakota towns. She has a voice of beautiful quality, high pitch and of unusual smoothness, while her folk songs and sketch readings in costume will satisfy the most fastidious taste. Miss
