SUPREME COURT

FROM BURKE COUNTY.

D. C. Knapp, vs. Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste. Marie Railway Co., a corporation, Defendant and Appellant.

Syllabus:

1. A railway company may be held liable in damages for the loss of freight which is being transferred from a connecting line of boats to its own line when it has agreed to transport the same from a point on said connecting line to a point on its own line of railroad, even though the connecting line is a separate and distinct corporation.

2. Evidence that a shipper was in the habit of making freight agreements with one C and was first induced by the said C, while acting ostensibly as an agent of the company, to build elevators along a lake and was given a rate by the said C upon a railroad which connected with a line of boats on said lake from the said elevators to a point upon the line of the railway company, and evidence that thereafter in seeking to collect damages from said railway company for the freight which was lost while being transferred from the line of boats to the line of said company that the correspondence was carried on with the said C and the said letters were signed by the said C as general agent upon a letterhead which denoted that they came from the office of the general freight agent of the company, coupled with evidence that after the solicitation of the business and the giving of the rate of twenty-two cents a receipt is given by the local agent of the company at the point on the lakes where the line of boats terminated and the railroad began for the said freight, stating that the same was received at the points of the location of the elevators of the shipper on the said lake, is sufficient both to prove the agency of C and the agreement by the railway company to transport the said freight from the elevators upon the connecting line of boats to the point of destination upon its own line.

3. Where a railway company is sought to be held liable on a contract which is made by its agents, it is sufficient to allege in the complaint that the contract was made by the railway company itself without referring to the intermediate agent or agency.

Appeal from the District Court of Burke County, Butts, J. Action to recover damages for the loss of freight. Judgment for Plaintiff. Defendant appeals.

Affirmed. Opinion of the Court by Bruce, J. Fisk, C. J. dissents.

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
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
