A. W. Lucas and Company Pleases Large Audiences With Fashion Show at Grand.

The fashion fete given yesterday by A. W. Lucas and company at the Grand theater drew a large and enthusiastic audience which packed the house. First there were pictures in the style of advertisements, telling of the different departments of the store. She conceived the idea of a scenario that should actually show how the Gossard corset is made in various models to fit all figures, by the use of living figures illustrating the different ones shown on the charts prepared by the company. Then followed a real demonstration of corsets. Also a very attractive exhibit of kimonos and bath robes. These called forth a great deal of applause and commendation from the ladies in the audience. Street dresses of equal charm followed, also suits with street hats and furs. All the accessories, both of the stage and the models, were everything which the most fastidious taste could demand.

Between scenes, Mr. W. L. Miller rendered two delightful vocal solos in his usual able and winning manner, accompanied by Miss Flora Harmon, and during the intermission Mrs. Baldwin sang. ZIMMERMAN MOVES SOUTH.

Big Cattle Interests Transferred to Texas.

Fort Yates, N. D., Oct. 12.—The Zimmerman cattle interests, which have long dominated in this section, will retire, and the last of their thousands of cattle have been shipped out.

The termination of grazing leases between the Zimmerman interests and the Indians of the reservation, through the Indian department of Washington, brought about the departure of the old-time cattle king with his train-loads of cattle.

For years the fine grazing lands of the Cannon Ball reservation have been at the command of Zimmerman cattle. It was upon the recommendation of a former superintendent, J. Kneale, that the contracts were terminated. The lands, sufficient to care for from 50,000 to 100,000 cattle yearly, are now being leased to other ranchers in small tracts. The Zimmerman cattle are being shipped to Texas, where the company has large holdings.

FORDVILLE TEN YEARS OLD.

Governor Will Speak at Its Anniversary Celebration.

Fordville, N. D., Oct. 12.—Fordville will hold a big celebration on the 10th anniversary of its founding on Oct. 23, at which time Governor C. B. Hanson will be the principal speaker at an entertainment program. Fordville was founded in 1905, at the completion of the Soo line through this section. Originally, it was known as Medford, but the name was subsequently changed.
