GEN. CARRANZA RECOGNIZED BY UNITED STATES

Seven Latin-American Nations Take Similar Action

Fletcher to Be U. S. Ambassador

Washington, Oct. 19.—General Carranza was formally recognized today as the chief executive of Mexico by the governments of the United States, Brazil, Chile, Argentina, Guatemala, Uruguay, Columbia and Nicaragua.

Each of the governments sent a letter to Ellaso Arredondo, personal representative here of Carranza.

Henry Prather Fletcher, at present American ambassador to Chile, practically has been decided upon as the next ambassador to Mexico.

ITALY DECLARES WAR ON THE BULGARIANS

London, Oct. 19.—Owing to the illness of Premier Asquith and the delicate negotiations which are proceeding between the Allies, the enlightenment of today's meeting of the house of commons was expected to have resigned from the cabinet, and on the substitution of Major Monro for Sir Ian Hamilton to command the Dardanelles, was not forthcoming.
